

BUSINESS WOMEN OF CITY TO ORGANIZE, MEET WEDNESDAY

Before and since the preliminary organization dinner meeting Wednesday night of the Business and Professional Women's club of Medford, to be affiliated with the national body, the enthusiasm displayed among the women workers of the city leads to the confident prediction that at the final organization meeting next Wednesday, the club will be launched with in the neighborhood of 75 members.

The constitution that was adopted at the dinner meeting sets forth the objects of the club as follows:

"To promote the welfare and good fellowship of all business and professional women; to increase their interest in civic, legislative, business and educational subjects; to gather and distribute information relative to vocational opportunities."

It is also set forth by the constitution that only local women of progressive ideas and good character are eligible to membership in the club. Membership shall become effective upon the payment of an initiation fee of \$3.00 and dues for one quarter, for all who do not go in as charter members, with 3 months in which to pay. The dues will be \$6 a year if paid quarterly, or if paid annually, \$5.

Medford won the first game last week-end by a 32-25 score and McCloud is considered one of the best teams in Northern California. A good preliminary has been arranged. The games start at seven-thirty.

Next week the Medford basketball team is to meet the Albany high school Friday afternoon and the University of Oregon Freshmen Saturday night. The Albany team has this season defeated the Eugene high school in Eugene, considered one of the strongest teams in the state. To defeat them would give the Medford team some idea of its strength and capabilities.

TO ADVERTISE FOR CRATER LAKE ROAD

At a meeting of the highway commission in Portland recently, attended by County Judge George Gardner and Commissioner George Alford, the commission agreed to advertise in March or April for bids to macadamize the nine miles of road now being constructed between McCloud and Cascade Gorge on the Crater lake highway. Work to be done without cost to the county.

They also agreed to widen the Green Springs and the Siskiyou mountain roads where necessary for safety, and to deepen the ditches for drainage at the state's expense.

The State Chamber of Commerce and county judges and county commissioners passed resolutions asking congress to appropriate \$250,000 to complete roads in Crater lake national park.

George H. Cecil, district forester, has recommended to the department the expenditure of \$42,000 on the upper Blue Ledge road to connect with the Klamath river highway in California.

PIONEER OF OREGON SETTLES IN MEDFORD

W. P. Wright, who is making his home with his son, Willard G. Wright and family in this city, is a pioneer in Oregon, having come to the state in 1848, when Washington was a part of Oregon, and located at Oregon City.

He was the first mail carrier after the state of Washington was formed, from Olympia to the mouth of the Columbia via Gray's harbor in 1858-59. In 1875 he moved to Coos bay and in 1890 to Grants Pass. He has been a surveyor for several years and assisted J. S. Howard, deceased, in surveying in southern Oregon.

FIRE DAMAGE IN CITY \$2609 UNTIL PAGE THEATER LOSS

Medford's fire damage during the past nine months, dating from the time Fire Chief Elliott went into office, March 1, until January 1, last, was low according to the chief's annual report filed with the city council, being only \$40,395.72; and the loss up to December 30 last before the Page theater fire, which was wholly beyond control when the fire alarm was turned in, for this period was only \$2609.09.

There were 68 alarms during this nine months' period, and four false alarms, including one fire outside the city limits. These fires are classified as follows: 17 grass fires, 16 flue fires, four sawdust fires, four auto fires, four oil stove fires, 3 fire place fires, 2 roof fires, 1 electric stove fire, 1 lumber yard fire, 1 garage fire, 1 store building fire, 1 furnace fire, 1 laundry fire, 1 saw mill fire, and 1 theater fire.

The fire department used 582 gals. of chemicals on the fires, and laid 7500 feet of hose and consumed 267 gallons of gas and 18 1/2 gallons of oil during this time.

Thirteen old buildings, which had been condemned by the city council as a fire menace, were razed under Chief Elliott's direction during the nine months.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Candido Aguilar, son-in-law of General Venustiano Carranza and secretary of state in the Carranza cabinet, was arrested here at noon today by department of justice agents for alleged violation of the neutrality laws.

General Aguilar, who has been an exile in Cuba since Obregon became president of Mexico, was taken into custody at the request of officials in San Antonio, Texas. The nature of the charge is not known.
