CITY COUNCIL OF ROGUE RIVER TO IMPROVE STREETS

ROGUE RIVER, Jan. 17.—The Rogue River city council met Monday night and organized for the year 1924. Messrs. Albert Milton, A. T. McIlvain, and Earl Strahan were sworn in as councilmen-elect. A program of road improvement and extension of water main was planned for the coming year. The mayor appointed the following standing committees: Health and sanitary, Van Goethen, Strahan, Swacker; finance, Swacker, Van Goethen, Strahan; light and water, McIlvain, Sparks, Milton; streets, Milton, Sparks, McIlvain. The mayor also made the following appointments: Town recorder, W. S. Cary; town treasurer, Fred O'Kelly; town marshal, R. W. Deshaizer; member of library board for four year term, Mrs. A. R. Brashers.

The Woodville Cemetery association, which has been organized for a number of years, held a meeting of the lot owners last Tuesday. The association found that they had not been legally organized and at this meeting cured this defect. They elected Messrs. Will Milton, Charles Hatch, and Stevens, trustees. The association is expecting a donation of one acre of ground south of the present cemetery and it is intended, if possible, to acquire other ground. The present cemetery and this ground will be fenced and all will be improved, thus putting our cemetery in a presentable condition which has long been badly neglected.

All the people of the community and many Grants Pass and Gold Hill people are looking forward to the big time at the Rogue River Community hall this coming Friday night, Jan. 18th. The event will be the two big games of basketball to be played by the Yreka high school with Rogue River high school and the Yreka Legion team against the Rogue River Town team, and the big chicken dinner to be served by the ladies of the church and community from 5:30 to 7 o'clock p. m. Both our high school team and town team were beaten by Browne's aggregations at Yreka by a small margin and our boys are tuning themselves for a real substantial revenge.

CRATER LAKE LODGE MANAGER SPEAKER AT ASHLAND FORUM

ASHLAND, Jan. 17.—The Chamber of Commerce will hold a very interesting Forum luncheon at the Hotel Ashland next Tuesday noon. Mr. James Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific and Professor Willis Finley, bird and animal authority, will give talks which will be illustrated by a hundred slides. Mr. R. W. Price, manager of the Crater Lake Lodge and president of the Oregon Hotelmen's association will also speak. This will be one of the best forum luncheons of the year and it is expected that a very large crowd will attend.
