CHIEF ELLIOTT OUT AGAIN, NOT ON ACTIVE DUTY

Very glad that he is alive and fairly well, altho still full of aches and pains, and able to walk about haltingly by the use of a crutch and cane, Fire Chief Roy Elliott left Sacred Heart hospital this morning to take up his headquarters in the fire department dormitory in the city, but will not be able to resume active duty for two weeks or more.

Nevertheless, after his confinement in the hospital since the morning of the Page theater fire, Dec. 30, when he was so badly injured by the falling wall which killed Amos Willis, he feels glad to get about again at all and hopes to exercise a general supervision over the department while he is recovering. Yesterday was the first time he was able to be up and don clothes in his room at the hospital.

Chief Elliott is full of gratitude for the many kindnesses, well wishes and flowers showered upon him by the people since the accident. His main trouble now is that the injury caused by the large timber falling across his left hip still somewhat incapacitates him, while the back and chest injuries are also somewhat bothersome.

Yes, indeed, I was very fortunate and lucky to escape the sad fate that met Amos," the chief said this forenoon. "I can't yet understand why I was not killed. As I lay there helpless under that pile of brick and other debris from the falling wall, with my head and part of my body buried under about two feet of it, I was conscious all the time, but of course could not see anything.

"But I could hear the voices of my rescuers, and I can tell you that the sound of these voices as the men began the work of digging me out, was the sweetest music I had ever heard or come to hear."
