DELROY GETCHELL TALKS THRIFT TO KIWANIS CLUB

The feature of the Kiwanis meeting today was a short, interesting talk on "Thrift" by Delroy Getchell, president of the Farmers & Fruitgrowers bank, this being thrift week. Mr. Getchell says thrift consists of real saving and then properly applying the savings. He called attention of the thrift of such nations as France, England and the United States, as compared with the greed for power and domain of Rome and Germany and the natural results that followed each.

Mr. Getchell said: "Money is the greatest invention in the world provided it has the proper stability and is rightfully used," but said he did not believe in money worship and that he would rather write one poem that would inspire people to nobler and better lives than to possess the wealth of nations."

He closed by calling attention to the wonderful climate and scenic advantages of the Rogue River valley, but said if Medford people do not show proper thrift in securing a new high school and better and more water to go along with other attractions they cannot hope to become the city of prominence, beauty and wealth that they should.

C. E. Barr told of his trip to California and spoke of the electric signs and other attractions of cities along the highway.

Capt. A. Burghdoff, state game warden told of the work being done by the game commission to preserve the game and game fish of the streams and lakes to keep up with the increasing number of hunters and modern methods used by them. He told of the wonderful increase of fingerling trout being planted in the streams of Oregon over what it was a few years ago and said 10,000 game birds, principally Chinese pheasants, were released this year where two years ago only a few hundred were released.

Mr. Hidden of Vancouver, Wash., told of the work of the Kiwanis club there with juveniles.

Former Ashland Man Sued for Divorce By His Second Wife

Marengo, Iowa, Jan. 19.—Echoes of a divorce suit brought by this first wife seven years ago in Ashland, Or., were features here today in the sensational divorce action against Roy Smith, partner in the Marengo Jewelry company. Mrs. Smith the second, accused Smith of extreme cruelty, immorality and failure to provide for her.

Smith underwent a cross-examination by H. M. Havner, former attorney general of Iowa, which developed the facts in connection with Smith's marriage to Miss Hazel E. Bressler at Oneal, Neb., in April, 1908, and the decrees of divorce obtained by her at Ashland, Ore., in 1916. His wife is suing for \$10,000 permanent alimony and custody of their child.

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
