

RADIO MESSAGE IS HEARD 4600 FEET DOWN IN A MINE

WALLACE, Idaho, January 21.—Forty-six hundred feet below the surface of the ground, in the Star cross-cut being run from the 2800 foot level of the Hecla mine shaft, a faint radio message was heard by members of a party of radio enthusiasts, mining men and others who descended into the mine yesterday with receiving equipment.

The experiment was made on the invitation of James F. McCarthy, president of the Hecla Mining company to determine if it were possible to utilize the radio in mine rescue work.

The sounds heard were not distinct although several of the listeners were positive that they were those of a man's voice. Homer A. Smith of Spokane, who conducted the experiment, asserted after the test that he could distinguish none of the code as the sounds were not strong enough. He said that the call "7" was the only sound that he was able to definitely distinguish.

Mining men who were present said that while, at the present time, radio will prove of little value in rescuing men cut off by a cave-in, it is probable that, with further development, it will be possible to utilize the ether in this manner.

They pointed out that it would be necessary to install in the mine broadcasting stations in remote sections of the mine in order that men cut off from communication by all other sources would be able to inform rescue crews of their whereabouts.

WESTERN UNION SUES TO GET STOLEN FUNDS

SEATTLE, Jan. 21.—Suit of the Western Union Telegraph Company was before Superior Court here today for \$1,240 alleged to be part of \$7,400 stolen from the Seattle cashier of the company October 2 by four men who were arrested at Grants Pass, Ore., two days later. The money was taken from Bert Jacobs, one of the prisoners, and used as evidence in his trial. An order restraining Police Chief William B. Severyns, County Clerk George Grant Jacobs and Attorney Henry Agnew from disposing of the money was asked.

SOUTH JOINS IN PAYING HONOR TO GEN. ROBERT E. LEE

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—The south has paid homage to the memory of General Robert E. Lee.

Governors of southern states, Confederate veterans and men and women high in rank in national and state affairs, stood with bowed heads as tons of granite crashed down the precipice of Stone Mountain, leaving on a thirty-foot square, the head of the south's greatest general standing out in relief, carved in native rock. As the granite tumbled on its way from the working platform to the ground below, two American flags, covering Lee's features, were drawn aside as Mrs. C. Helen Plane, 94 years old, widow of a Confederate colonel who died in battle, and a charter member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, commanded Stone Mountain to give forth the head of Lee, commander in chief of the armies of the confederacy.

Lee's head is the first unit of what is destined to be one of the world's greatest monuments. In living stone, the head of General Lee is the central figure about which will be carved a panoramic display of Dixie's immortals as an everlasting memorial to those who died for the confederate cause.

OREGON RANKS 27TH IN NUMBER CARS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 21.—In the matter of motor vehicles, Oregon ranked 27th among the 48 states of the union in 1923, according to statistics received from a large rubber company today by Sam Koser, secretary of state. Mr. Koser said the figures are reliable. Oregon had 166,323 motor vehicles in 1923, a gain of 23.6 per cent over 1922 when the registration was 134,566. New York state was first on the list with 1,214,090 machines; California was second with 1,055,910; Ohio was third with 1,070,000; and Pennsylvania was fourth with 1,064,625.

GONZAGA COACH SIGNS FOOTBALL CONTRACT

SPOKANE, Jan. 21.—Announcement that Charles E. (Gus) Dornas, has signed a contract to continue as athletic coach at Gonzaga university here, for another year, was made tonight at the annual football banquet. In connection with the announcement it was revealed that Dornas has declined an offer of \$6500 from Detroit university and a similar offer from the University of Wisconsin, together with a number of other attractive offers. He will receive an advance in salary on his new contract.

Dornas came to Gonzaga in 1920 from Notre Dame, where he was assistant football coach and coach of basketball and baseball.

Natron Cutoff Most Important New R. R. Construction in U. S.

First in importance in the whole United States is new railway construction for the present year is the Eugene-Klamath Falls line of the Southern Pacific and this is set forth with authority by the annual statistical number of the Railway Age. In an informing article on railway improvements for the year the Oregon work is given the place of honor among them all.

The longest and most expensive project which has been authorized is the Natron cut-off of the Southern Pacific, extending from Kirk, Ore., to Oakridge, a distance of 118 miles, and involving an expenditure of \$115,000,000. This line will provide an alternate route with lower grades than the present line over the Siskiyou mountains," reads the article.—Portland Oregonian.
