COURT SEES CONSPIRACY (Continued From Page One)

"That's all right, old man."

Illness prevented Mrs. Edith Burns, Miss Normand's companion, from appearing in court yesterday to tell what she knew of the case and it was indicated that another extraordinary session might be held at her home today should she again fail to appear.

Kept Mabel "Hopped Up."

The three principal witnesses who have testified so far are Edna Purviance, film actress; Mabel Normand, film actress, both of whom were members of the company in Dines' apartment when he was shot, but who deny being in the room when the shooting occurred, and Dines himself.

The testimony of the three has been characterized by repeated replies of "I don't know," or "I don't remember."

Following Dines' testimony, taken late yesterday at the hospital bedside, Police Officer H. L. Bain, who visited the apartment after the shooting, took the stand today. Bain swore that Dines told him that Greer did the shooting. Bain said Greer came to the police station with the announcement that he had shot Dines three times because he "kept Mabel hopped up."

Asked whether "hopped up" referred to narcotics or liquor, Bain testified that Greer replied "liquor, I guess."

A determined effort was made by Greer's attorneys to keep Bain's testimony off the record, but Judge Hanby overruled all objections and the policeman continued.

He said that when he went to Dines' apartment he found Dines lying on a bed, clad in his undershirt and socks. Dines said, the officer testified, that he had been shot.

"Her chauffeur shot me," were the words Bain declared Dines used.

"Whose chauffeur?" the policeman said he queried.

"Miss Normand's" he said Dines replied.

Bain said that Dines asked who he was and when the wounded man learned that Bain was a police officer, the old man "shut up."

The witness continued that he asked Miss Normand and Miss Purviance who were sitting at a breakfast table in one of the rooms of the Dines' apartment, if they knew anything about the shooting. He said they replied they did not know who did the shooting and that they knew nothing about it.

Police Lieutenant L. G. Ammon, who talked with Greer at the Wilshire station following his surrender, testified that the defendant had appeared at the station in tears, crying:

"The poor girl, the poor girl; she has been sick for a long time and should go to the hospital for an operation and the dirty rat has kept her drunk."

"I asked him who he meant by the poor girl and he said Mabel Normand and that Dines was the man he had shot."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The house today eliminated from the interior department appropriation bill a section providing for abolishment of 21 land offices on July one.

REPORT GRAND JURY IS EXPECTED SOON

Owing to Circuit Judge Charles M. Thomas holding court in Josephine county, no indictments have been reported by the grand jury which has been in session since last Tuesday, with a day's adjournment.

Among the matters reported to have been under investigation are several liquor cases, and the bond sales of J. H. Martin, who disappeared after extradition papers had been secured for his return from California. The grand jury is expected to make its final report in a couple of days.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—(By Associated Press.) The British dominions have unanimously approved the draft of the Anglo-American liquor treaty, submitted to them by the British government. The draft thus approved had been agreed upon by the London and Washington governments.
