Carl Y. Tengwald throws his hat into the ring today as a republican candidate for the office of county clerk, making the third candidate for this position so far announced.

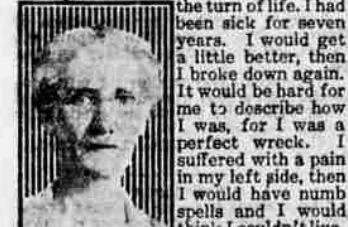

RUGH PAVEMENT PROPOSAL UP TO COURT TOMORROW

Petitions asking for the paving of the road from Medford to Ruch, via Jacksonville, which have been circulated throughout the county for the past week, will be presented to the county court tomorrow for consideration by that body.

It is estimated that the county has on hand in round figures, \$164,000 for this work, derived from the following sources:

\$80,000 left over and unsold from the bond issue of May, 1920. These bonds were issued for five, ten and twenty years, and are valid until they expire.

\$43,102.31, raised by county levies this year for market roads, this sum to be matched by the state, making a total of \$86,204.62. The grand total is therefore approximately \$166,204.62.

The mileage of the road would be eleven miles, as one mile on the Jacksonville hill would not be paved, according to the present plans. The cost of the road is estimated at \$13,000 per mile, making the total cost, approximately \$143,000.

The exact figures on the county debt, are not available, as the various offices are making up the reports for the year. According to the county clerk it is in the neighborhood of \$800,000.

A large crowd of tax payers are expected at this meeting to give their views on the proposal.

ANOTHER BANK IN MONTANA CLOSES

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Jan. 22.—A decision to declare voluntarily liquidation was received yesterday by stockholders of the Stockmen's National bank of Fort Benton, one of the oldest banking institutions in Montana. It was learned here today.

This decision, subject to the approval of the comptroller of currency, was voted by two-thirds of the stockholders. F. E. Stranahan, president of the bank, was appointed liquidating agent under bond of \$25,000. He estimated that the bank after charging off losses, is solvent with a surplus of \$200,000. The bank has been in business 44 years.

REBEL BLOCKADE OF TAMPICO CALLED OFF

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The rebel blockade of the port of Tampico has been "postponed" until the end of the present month, Rear Admiral Magruder reported to the navy department today on his arrival off that port aboard his flagship, the cruiser Richmond.

In announcing receipt of this message, the state department said that Admiral Magruder had not indicated the source of his information. His message, however, served to relieve tension in Washington in connection with the Tampico situation.

Admiral Magruder is understood to have wide discretionary powers in protecting American commerce and American interests generally from any interference by the blockading forces.

MEDFORD GASOLINE PRICE NOW 24C

Just when Medford car owners were enjoying life this forenoon and joining with the general populace in debating the income tax and soldier's bonus questions along came the surprising news that the oil companies and all the service stations, in accordance with telegraphic orders from their headquarters, had raised the price of gas two cents, which gave them something else to talk about.

This raise is general with all the oil companies throughout the state. Gasoline which was 22 cents, is now 24 cents distillate which was 21 cents, is now 22 1/2 cents.

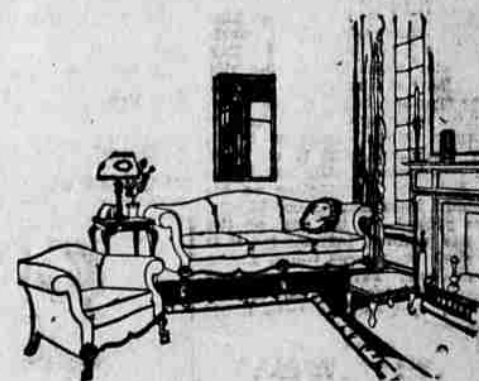
