JAKE SCHAEFER DEFEATS HOPPE IN FIRST GAME

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jake Schaefer defeated Willie Hoppe, 500 to 369, in the first 500 point block of their 1500 point challenge match here last night and his victory, billiard fans declared, seems to bear out their prediction that the San Franciscan would again lift the 18.2 ball line billiard crown from the head of Mr. Hoppe.

This, the third challenge match in as many seasons, has been in the nature of a rubber. Schaefer defeated Hoppe for the championship here in 1921, after Hoppe had held it continuously since 1912, but lost it again to him last year in the tournament at New York.

Schaefer played a steady, and, at times, a brilliant game, going out in 13 innings with an unfinished run of 48 and an average of 38.6-13. Although the score board shows five blank innings and another of a simple score for the challenger, it does not reflect on the worth of his game, but explains an apparent desire to play safe and leave Hoppe in as difficult position as possible.

Schaefer's control and his judgment of distance was near perfect but frequent lineups during his long runs indicated that his judgment of speed was not so good. In his high run of 170 he had to play thirteen masses and ten bank shots.

The challenger played a tight game and, although frequently left with difficult leaves, his marvelous open table playing enabled him to gather the balls and nurse them along for high runs.

Hoppe's evident failure to consistently score big runs may have been due to the many hard safeties Jake left him. However, when he was able to get the ivories together, he displayed the same brilliant technique that has kept him champion these many years and during the block got away with the high run of the night, 180, and, another of 112. His average was 30.9-12.

The three blank innings and two of one point each credited to the champion were the result of bad leaves and safety plays.

From all appearances the husky little 138 pound "tax" packs a mighty good wallop and shows foot work and speed that will spell a tough battle for Johnny about three moons from now. Johnny has little to say about the coming scrap and seems to be convinced that he has a stiff proposition ahead of him when he tangles with the Seattle boy. Johnny, himself, is a clever scrapper and southern Oregon fans believe that he can at least hold his own on Friday night. The Goddard-Carlson main event will be an eight round affair with three minute rounds.

"Blackie" Jordan and "Young" Kennedy will stage the semi-wind up. Kennedy, it seems, is more or less of an unknown quantity here but fans who have seen him work out say that he is a "comer." Jordan is a fighting colored boy and, while he doesn't claim any relationship to Jack Johnson, he believes he can sustain the flinty reputation of the dusky race at Friday's smoker. This semi-windup will consist of six, entertaining, three minute rounds if it lasts that long.

According to Martin Bowers, who is promoting the smoker Friday, there will be three good preliminary bouts featuring such pugilistic aspirants as the little Harrel boys and Earl Johnson. The various bouts, twenty-six rounds in all, will be staged at the Medford gymnasium with entrance opposite the Rialto theater.

SEES GOOD YEAR FOR SHEEP MEN, ECONOMY URGED

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 22.—

The year 1924 holds a promise of continued stabilization and the beginning of progress and prosperity for the wool growing industry. President Frank J. Hagenbarth declared in an address before the annual convention of the National Wool Growers association here today.

"With efficient and conservative management the wool grower, will, in the next two or three years, be able to relieve himself of debt and begin the accumulation of a surplus with which to absorb the next shock to the industry," he said.

Dealing with the tariff Mr. Hagenbarth asserted the "reduction or destruction of the tariff does not seem to be as imminent during the presidential year as we have been accustomed to."

Mr. Hagenbarth said the National Wool Growers' association had been active in promoting and assisting the western tariff association and urged continued support.

The wool grower president declared financing plans of congress a failure and gave these two reasons:

"First lack of education and understanding by the grower and his financial advisers, and second, the red tape and cumbersome and sometimes unreasonable restrictions that surround the administration of the law."

Cooperative marketing and organization were declared by Mr. Hagenbarth to be the two major problems which now face sheep raisers and he characterized as un-American the plan of the department of agriculture to commercialize the grazing facilities of the national forests.

"These are good times to place economy in every direction and get out of debt," he urged in conclusion.

Too much debt in a broader sense means inflation and over expansion and these in turn mean over production and lower prices.

ORIENTAL GARDENS IN FESTIVE GARB

The Oriental gardens at the Nat are in festive garb this week because of the masquerade ball which will be held there Wednesday evening. Tom Swem, Seely Hall and Emerson Merrick, assisted by a corps of workmen, have been busily engaged in putting on the finishing touches on the already beautiful hall so that it will be a fitting setting for colorful costumes which will be worn by the masqueraders tomorrow evening. The stage setting, for example, will be different from anything ever seen in southern Oregon and will be one of many attractions of Wednesday night's dance. Beautiful lighting effects have been arranged, part of which include enormous, brightly colored hanging lamps with diameters of eighteen feet and more.

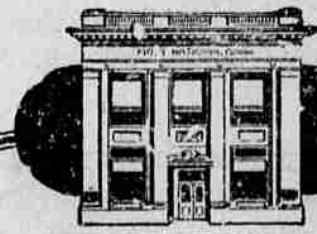
