SHERIFF REPORTS
A NEW CLUE ON
THE D'AUTREMONTS

According to Sheriff Terrill, a new clue to the whereabouts of the D'Autremont brothers—Ray, Roy and Hugh—indicted in this county, and by the federal court, as perpetrators of the Siskiyou tunnel murders and attempted train robbery October 11, last, has been received by the postal authorities, in the shape of a letter, written from an unnamed town in Oklahoma, to the mother of a girl friend of one of the brothers in Roseburg.

"The letter was written to the mother, and turned over to the girl. That's the way they worked," said the sheriff.

A checkup of the letter was immediately started by the authorities.

According to the sheriff, all the mail received by the parents of the suspected youths, at the Eugene post-office is first inspected by the postal authorities, the parents agreeing to this plan willingly as a means of tracing their sons.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22.—A small gold cross worn by the Rev. Percy W. the single investigation. The president intends to take no other action, however, so long as the committee's inquiry is continued.

The purpose of the department's observation is to take note of any evidence of irregularities or illegal actions on the part of anyone which may develop in the course of the inquiry.
