ONE ORDINANCE PASSED AT CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The city council and city water commission held separate meetings, as always, in the city hall last night and each body transacted routine business and discussed plans for future legislation and rules.

The council passed one ordinance, which permits C. A. DeVore to erect and maintain a service station on the vacant lot at the corner of Almond and East Main streets, through transferring the land on which the station is to be located from a purely residential zone to a zone that allows apartment houses and retail stores. Later Mr. DeVore also plans to erect a double dwelling house on the same lot.

The city water commission, with members A. L. Hill, Delroy Getchell and Olsen Arnsperger present voted to meet hereafter on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month instead of on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays, as heretofore, so as not to hold meetings on the same nights as the city council.

KLAMATH WOMAN SHOT BY MAN WHO KILLS HIMSELF

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 23.—Al Powers, 36, shot and killed himself here last night after shooting and seriously injuring Miss Ethel Stearns, lodging house proprietress. According to Miss Stearns, Powers entered the room where she was playing solitaire, and said, "you have done me dirt." He then shot her, the bullet entering her neck and emerging from her cheek. He then shot himself. A letter found on Powers by the police from Miss Stearns, stated that she was "through" with him and that \$50 enclosed would be the last she would give him.
