HOPPE RETAINS CHAMPIONSHIP AVERAGE 22.6

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—Willie Hoppe of New York, veteran champion at 13.2 ball line billiards, took the last block of a poorly played 1500 point challenge match from Young Jake Schaefer here last night 500 to 417, and thereby retained his crown. Young Jake, son of the "wizard" of other days, was threatening on the first night, when he got 500 to Hoppe's 369, but curled up Tuesday night, when Hoppe brought the score to 1000 to 739 by not playing quite so poorly as did the challenger.

Last night's block was a repetition of the poor ball line play of the previous night, it taking the champion 22 innings to get the necessary 500 points an average of 22.22 while in one inning less Schaefer was counting 417 for an average of 21.16-21. Hoppe won because it appeared that he was better able to overcome difficulties encountered, according to the spectators, through effects of climatic conditions on the sensitive ivory balls and also it seemed, through faulty judgment by both of the speed of the table. Luck also played its part and the majority of breaks were in Hoppe's favor. The men indulged in much safety play and that also was held responsible for the "slow" billiards exhibited. Hoppe's average for the 1500 points was 27.42-54 and that of Schaefer 22.8-54. Hoppe had a high run of 182 and Young Jake 170. Edouard Moremans has challenged Hoppe and that contest probably will be played within sixty days at New York, after Hoppe and Schaefer return from a tour which now is being arranged.

Johnny has also been practicing a lot lately and believes himself at least able to stay with the northern boy the scheduled eight rounds.

Preliminary events will feature such boys as "Blackie" Jordan, "Young" Kennedy, Ray Draws, Kid Allen, Dick Rush, Bernie Draws, Bennie Harrel, Nobel Everett, and Chauncey Hooker. These boys are all training for Friday's smelter and, between them all, should furnish a good program to introduce the Goddard-Carlson main event.

12 INDICTMENTS RETURNED, 10 FOR BOOZE VIOLATION

A dozen indictments, ten of the lot for alleged violations of the liquor laws, were returned by the grand jury Wednesday, the grand jury recessing until next Monday, without filing a signed report.

F. R. Kennedy was indicted on two counts, charging possession of liquor and throwing glass on a public thoroughfare. At the time of his arrest, Kennedy, it is alleged, endeavored to foil the officers by throwing the bottle of hooch on the sidewalk. He was sentenced recently to ten days in jail for contempt of court by Justice of the Peace Taylor.

Harry Tracy, a cowboy, arrested in the Green Springs mountain district a week ago by Federal Enforcement Officer Newton Chaney and Deputy Sheriff George Alden, was indicted on four counts, charging possession of mash, possession of a still, selling liquor, and possession of liquor. On the first two counts Tracy entered pleas of guilty, and on the other two pleaded not guilty.

George DuBois, a former hospital worker of this city, was indicted on two counts, charging intoxication and possession of liquor. Through Attorney George Roberts, a plea of not guilty was entered.

Clifford Hickson of Eagle Point was indicted for possession of liquor and John Mayhem of the same place was indicted for being drunk.

Four John Doe warrants, alleging, it is said, violations of the liquor laws were returned, and the sheriff's office served bench warrants this morning. Ray Varney of Jacksonville, was indicted charged with "assault upon his wife with a club." A plea of not guilty was entered.

John Ellis and J. Kent were indicted for theft of a Dodge coupe. They entered pleas of guilty.

C. E. Lloyd of this city, acquitted at the last term of court on a forgery charge, and immediately thereafter rearrested upon a bench warrant requested by Assistant District Attorney Winfield Gaylord, was indicted on a charge of "issuing a check on a bank with no funds therein." The amount was \$2.50.

In those cases where pleas of guilty were filed, sentence will be passed next Monday, the court announced.
