

U. S. TROOPS BURN STRONGHOLD OF MORO FANATICS

MANILA, Jan. 24.—(By the Associated Press)—One constabulary soldier and two fanatics were killed in a clash on Bucos island, off the coast of Mindanao, where members of the religious society of Moros have been causing trouble, according to advices received here from Surigao.

The town of Socorro, where fanatics had entrenched themselves has been burned by Colonel Bowers, constabulary commander of Surigao, who believes that its destruction will result in collapse of the uprising.

Colonel Bowers, who recently asked for reinforcements in measures to pacify the fanatics after they had killed nineteen constabulary soldiers and lost eighty of their own number, telegraphed today that he landed at Socorro with 100 men under cover of machine gun fire from the gunboat Sacramento. He found the fanatics fortified and apparently prepared to hold the town. Their number recently was reported to be 600. After

burning the town Colonel Bowers took his force aboard the Sacramento.

Governor General Leonard Wood's yacht, the Apo, which was dispatched to the scene when reinforcements were asked, has reached Surigao with a detachment of constabulary troops and will return to Iligan for additional forces.

CORVALLIS PRIZE COW FOUND TO BE A MASS OF JUNK

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 24.—The "cow ostrich" is the latest phenomenon in the Oregon Agricultural college. Judging from the hardware within her, everything is eatable.

After using her lungs as a pin cushion and her stomach as a gravel pit, bossy was finding it impossible to live up to her record as being one of the best milk producing Holsteins in the dairy herd. The dairy department sold her for \$5 to the Veterinary medicine department, requesting that an autopsy be made to discover why she suddenly thought she had produced enough milk to warrant keeping her the rest of her days.

In addition to defective organs making examination difficult, two dozen nails fastened her system together in various parts. Once she nearly stabbed herself when a nail protruding through her lung came within half an inch of her heart. A piece of brass was lodged in her third stomach. Pieces of balling wire totaling a yard in length completed her hardware supply. Three-fourths of a pint of sand and gravel occupied part of the second stomach's capacity.

To her record of being one of the best milk producing cows has been added her record of having energy to keep alive after developing more abnormal conditions than any other animal recorded.

TOURIST TRAVEL IN OREGON NOW WORTH \$15,000,000

An audience of 9000 Medfordites gathered at the Armory last night gained much enlightenment about the wonderful scenic attractions of Oregon in addition to their knowledge of Crater Lake and that the Rogue River valley is scenically and climatically one of the most delightful places in the nation to reside, and had it brought home to them in a convincing manner what a wonderful asset the tourist business is to the state and Medford.

The lectures of J. A. Ormondy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific lines, and R. W. Price, general manager and vice-president of the Crater Lake National Park company were interspersed by lantern slides and movies about the wild life of the state. Mr. Ormondy's subject was "Is the Tourist Business Worth While?" and Mr. Price talked on the "Scenic Beauties of Oregon." This free, educational entertainment was given through the courtesy of the Southern Pacific company and the Crater Lake National Park company.

The speakers were introduced by Vernon Vawter, and members of the Crater club acted as ushers. While Mr. Price confined his lecture to detailing on the scenic attractions of the state, Mr. Ormondy dwelt upon the importance of the fast growing tourist trade of the state, with its between 400,000 and 500,000 tourists last year and their expenditures of \$15,000,000, and stated that it had become one of the greatest assets of the state.

Oregon Delights the Eye.
"Oregon has more beauties than any other state," was the confident statement of Mr. Price, in opening his lecture, and then dilated upon the fact that Southern Oregon had but a part of them, and that the people of the valley must visit other parts of the state to see their wealth of scenic attractions.

As he talked beautifully colored lantern slides were thrown upon the screen. He talked upon the scenic attractions from Rainier National park to Ashland and Crater Lake, even taking in the country about Bend and the by-the-sea attractions of the just-developing Port Orford section. The Oregon Caves and the McKenzie river and pass were dwelt upon.

"During the year that has just been closed there visited in Oregon from other states and foreign countries between 400,000 and 500,000 tourists, who spent within the borders of the state, according to the most conservative efforts fifteen million dollars," said Mr. Ormondy.

"The tourist business is one of the principal basic industries of the state and within a few years will probably pass by a very generous margin the income returned to the state by such important industries as dairy products, which are credited with an annual return of about \$21,000,000 annually, and livestock, now rated as approximately 23 millions annually."

"It is not at all unlikely that within the next few years the tourist business will have outstripped the returns from our other important industries except the major industries such as lumber, field agriculture and transportation and public utilities."

"My conviction is that the money spent by the tourist is distributed more generally and more evenly through the channels of trade than the returns from any of our other basic industries. This is accounted for partly by the fact that a portion of this new money reaches us through the hotels and transportation companies."

Big Tourist Expenditures.
"To my mind the hotels and transportation companies are among the greatest distributing centers of our commercial life because into their operation enters the output of nearly every basic industry. Moreover, the turnover of money in those institutions is exceedingly fast."

"At this juncture Mr. Ormondy emphasized his remarks along this line by giving an analysis of the supplies used at Crater Lake lodge by the Crater Lake National Park company during the tourist season 1923, that is the three months of July, August and September."

"In that time there were consumed 230 dozen eggs, 400 pounds of pork and bacon, 9000 pounds of potatoes, 3000 cans of vegetables of various kinds approximating 7000 pounds, and 8000 pounds of meat."

"This constitutes only a portion of supplies consumed by the tourists at Crater Lake lodge last season," the speaker continued.

"I understand the Crater lake people sold to tourists something like 18,000 post cards of Oregon scenery and an enormous quantity of colored pictures and miscellaneous souvenirs. "I am using Crater lake as an example of the tourist, because practically all of the people who patronize Crater Lake lodge are tourists and most of them are from out of the state."

"If you will take into consideration the enormous quantity of supplies consumed by the tourists at the various hotels, restaurants, camps and other eating places in our state and the huge quantity of souvenirs, merchandise of all descriptions, gas, oil and repairs, which they purchase so readily, it is not hard to understand why the tourist leaves such a large amount of money behind him."

Why Oregon Attracts.
"The history of the western tourist business shows that it has increased steadily from year to year. This increase is accounted for by the fact that the west coast of the United States is becoming better advertised and better known, and with our staple, even and glorious summer climate, history is bound to repeat itself in the future."

"The scenery, the delightful summer climate of our state and such outstanding attractions as Crater Lake National park, the Oregon Caves, the Portland Rose festival, the Columbia River highway and

others which might be mentioned, have been exploited liberally and generously by the Southern Pacific and other railroad companies. The crowds of tourists who visited Oregon and the Pacific northwest last season are only the vanguard of those other hordes of tourists who are yet to come in ever increasing numbers as the years go by."

"We are a favored people, and according to the laws of economics are entitled to and will, without any particular effort on our part, reap an ever increasing harvest from tourist travel, yet if we are to reap the full benefits of this most lucrative trade, it behooves us to study it and to foster it and to anticipate the future needs of this great basic industry."

collusion" between the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport company (a Doheny company) and anybody whatsoever, in connection with subsequent oil contracts entered with the government by the company.

Mr. Doheny gave the date of the loan as November 30, 1921, or several months before the interior secretary signed the contract leasing the California reserve to the Doheny interests.

Mr. Fall had told him, Mr. Doheny said, that he hoped to raise a loan and that he had expected to get the money from "Mr. McLean." This, the witness said, he took as a hint to him, and he replied that he would be glad to loan the money.

After Mr. Doheny's testimony, Mr. Fall will be questioned, when he appears, regarding his statements of December 27, to the committee in which he said:

"It should be needless for me to say that in the purchase of the Harris ranch or in any other purchase or expenditure I have never approached Mr. L. Doheny or anyone connected with him or any of his corporations, or Mr. H. F. Sinclair or anyone connected with him or any of his corporations, nor have I ever received from either of said parties one cent on account of any oil lease or any account whatsoever."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—William S. Hill of Mitchell, S. D., a banker and

farmer, was nominated by President Coolidge today for the interior state's vacancy on the shipping board and the nominations of Frederick I. Thompson of Mobile, Ala., and Bert E. Haney of Portland, Ore., which were withdrawn several weeks, were returned to the senate.
