Now if the road between Medford and Ruch is paved it will probably cost the county a quarter of a million—two hundred and fifty thousand dollars—before it is completed, all estimates to the contrary notwithstanding. 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B. F. MULKEY TO DELIVER ADDRESS LINCOLN BANQUET

To the Editor:

In the campaign of 1912 the republican party was engaged in the greatest family row in the political history of this country. The outcome of this factional controversy was the election of Woodrow Wilson, a democrat. Thousands of republicans everywhere were smarting from the scratches and bruises received in this factional fight. Many of them felt that our defeat was well deserved and were inclined to give the new president and his policies their support. Even the republicans in congress when the new president would appear before that body and ask support for some of his pet measures, like the repeal of canal tolls, would give him a vote of confidence. A little later republicans were to become disillusioned and learn that Wilson was the most narrowly partisan president that had ever occupied the White House.

February 12, 1915, we held our first Lincoln Day banquet. A short time prior to this at a banquet held on Jackson Day at Indianapolis, President Wilson delivered a very partisan address in which he said that the republican party had not had a new idea in thirty years. A few days after this speech I met Colonel R. C. Washburn of Table Rock on the street and asked him what he thought of the president's speech at Indianapolis. "Well," he said, "from this time on I expect to do what I can in my poor weak way to put the skids under this windy old burlesque who has landed in a high place by a fluke."

The Colonel delivered an address at our first Lincoln Day banquet a few weeks later, which indicated that he was still laboring under the same feeling that he had expressed a few days after the president's attack on the republican party. This speech was notable in that it was probably the first public attack on President Wilson and his policies that had been delivered on the Pacific coast and was published in some of the big papers on the coast and also in the east.

I remember that George Putnam was there, and when it got too hot for him he yawned, muttering as he left that it seemed we were still living in the stone age.

B. F. Mulkey delivered a short address on Lincoln that night that was an inspiration. The charter members of the club will remember it very well. Rosenbaum's famous portrait of Lincoln was hung on the wall above the speaker's table, draped with American flags. After Mulkey got to going good he climbed up on a radiator in the window, opening it, and beneath this picture, it was dramatic in the extreme and the audience went wild.

The program committee has invited Mr. Mulkey to deliver the address on Lincoln at our banquet to be held on the 12th of February this year. Below is printed his letter accepting this invitation.

"My dear Anderson: Yours of the 18th inst. at hand. I shall be pleased to be present with you February 12th as your guest and deliver an address on Lincoln. Indeed, I appreciate very highly this opportunity to visit Medford and my old friends out there under such favorable conditions and circumstances. The death of my brother-in-law, state Dairy and Food Commissioner Hawley, prevented my being in Medford on the day of the Elks' memorial exercises. This was a great disappointment to me, so I am really somewhat more than glad to be able to be with you at the Lincoln Day banquet.

"Thanking you for the invitation and for the confidence it implies, I have the honor to be, meanwhile, Very Sincerely, "B. F. MULKEY," BERT ANDERSON.

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
