

COOLIDGE STRONG THROUGHOUT STATE SAYS PATTERSON

"I find Coolidge-for-president sentiment very strong in the state wherever I have been so far," said L. L. Patterson, campaign manager for President Coolidge's candidacy in Oregon, with headquarters in Portland, this afternoon, "and the Coolidge sentiment in Medford and Jackson county I find exceptionally strong and I learn that the republicans here are planning to organize a Coolidge club with 1000 members, or more."

Mr. Patterson accompanied by his wife, arrived here yesterday on his campaign organization auto tour of the western and southern part of the state during which he visited Albany, Roseburg and Grants Pass, stopped only for an hour or two at Eugene, and now is visiting this city and Ashland. He spent this afternoon in Ashland, and returns here tonight. Tomorrow morning he will leave by auto for Eugene to install the organization work there, and when this is completed he will visit Marshfield and organize that city; then return to headquarters at Portland.

Senator Patterson has been a very busy man since his arrival here yesterday with his conferences with leading republicans of this city, Ashland and throughout the county. He is enthusiastic about the sentiment for Coolidge he has encountered, which leads him to the belief that old Jackson county is for Coolidge almost by acclamation, especially as no opposing sentiment has been found. He is stopping at the Hotel Medford. He found the same sentiment existing in Josephine county on his visit there.

The state Coolidge campaign headquarters are located in the Imperial hotel at Portland, one room of which has been set aside to care for the heavy and fast increasing correspondence.

FRANCE SIGNS A NEW TREATY WITH CZECHO

PARIS, Jan. 25.—(By Associated Press). A treaty between France and Czechoslovakia was signed at the foreign office today by Premier Poincaré and Dr. Edouard Benes, the Czechoslovakian foreign minister.

Altho the treaty has been termed in some quarters a defensive pact, spokesmen for the Prague government have said it contains no military obligations on either France or Czechoslovakia, providing only for "understanding" between the staffs of the two nations.

It is said the treaty contains a statement of the two countries' decision not to allow the return of either the Hohenzollern dynasty in Germany or the Hapsburgs in Hungary.

In Memorium

Funeral services for the late Rev. Eli Fisher, former pastor of the Christian church here, who died in Roseburg at the soldiers' hospital on January 4, were held at Pacific Grove, Cal., where he had held a successful pastorate. His body laid in state from 9 a. m. until the hour of burial at 2:00 p. m. when Mr. Lobdell, the pastor of the Christian church, paid a touching tribute to the aged minister and veteran as one of the most beloved citizens of Pacific Grove, and a one who had devoted his long life to the interests of his fellow men.

Members of Lucius Fairchild Post, of which Mr. Fisher was a past adjutant, acted as pall bearers, and the body was laid to rest with full military honors.

Eli Fisher was born in Tazewell county, Illinois, May 26, 1841, and when a student in Eureka college, of which his brother, Professor Asa Fisher, was one of the founders, he was one of the first to respond to Lincoln's call for 75,000 volunteers. On April 19, 1861, and after a period of active campaigning in Missouri and Kentucky he was discharged for disability and returned to Eureka college, where he took both A. B. and A. M. degrees. He followed in a long and successful term of years in pastorates and evangelistic work in Illinois, Nebraska, Montana, Oregon and California.

About 25 years ago Mr. Fisher served as pastor of the Medford Christian church for several years, and was very well known throughout the valley.

On June 21, 1920, he was married to his second wife, Mrs. Margaret Darnell of Medford, who is the only remaining charter member of the Christian church in Medford. They came to make Medford their home. Mrs. Fisher, who is remaining to visit relatives and friends in California, will return to Medford in the near future.
