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and permanently established. At least one troop has its full number of 32 scouts and another is very near it. More than two-thirds have passed their tenderfoot tests and are now being registered in the national council.

"A number have asked me about the nature of the local organization," stated Mr. Coan. "Let me state it briefly that there may be no misunderstanding. We are, of course, a part of the national scout organization. We have a board of control known as the Crater Lake local council. This council is composed of representatives from the civic, religious, educational and business institutions of the community, and the scout masters. Each church which has a troop

has one representative in the council. Each of the other named institutions have one. The troops are each sponsored by a church, which provides the scout master and a troop committee of three men who have the immediate charge of the troop.

"There is no provision for fraternal organizations to be represented on the council and no particular need for them as the other bodies give a fair and equitable distribution to the community. There are no independent troops. No one church or organization can control or manage the affairs of the movement in Medford. This representative council supervises the general affairs and each church the leadership and training of the scouts. We are concerned with the training and education of the boys and nothing else. The movement is as democratic as it can possibly be made. No faction, clique or sect is managing the Medford scout enterprise. The whole-souled backing which the community is giving us is deeply appreciated by the men who are giving so much time to its success. Our only motive is to provide the best possible advantage for the training of the boys of Medford in all those essential traits and principles which every American boy should have. The Boy Scouts of America is the only organization which has successfully put forward a program that has been anything like adequate to meet the great boy problem which confronts parents, churches and communities. In another few months the scouts will fully demonstrate its worth to Medford."

MANILA, Jan. 25.—(By the Associated Press)—Marie Bernarda Baltayan, a Philippine woman, who claims to be the leader of the Colorums, reputed religious fanatics who recently killed nineteen constabulary soldiers in outbreaks on Luzon island, Surigao province, has declared that her followers want peace and order and whenever trouble comes that they will always work with the champions of peace.

"We are constantly beset by enemies," she is quoted as saying, "all sorts of stories have been fabricated against me and my followers, we want justice in the islands and our order and church will always endeavor to preserve peace."

"I am credited with possessing supernatural powers. This is untrue. I do not deny that I know magnetism, but it is all a matter of faith and will. My followers believe that I have supernatural powers of healing, but in reality I only succeed in healing them because they have faith in what I am able to do."
