

BOK OFFERS TO GIVE CONGRESS \$100,000 PRIZE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—An offer to duplicate his \$100,000 prize to the author of any peace plan, selected by the senate committee investigating the peace plan, has been made by Edward W. Bok, in a letter to Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire, chairman of the committee.

"I will also agree," Mr. Bok wrote, "to defray the expenses of a nationwide referendum, if desired, and in all respects give the plan which your committee selects the same financial support accorded by me to the present plan."

With regard to the cost of the American peace award campaign, its lacker declared he did not have the definite information required by the committee, but suggested that Cornelius N. Bliss, treasurer of the award should be summoned.

The text of Mr. Bok's letter to Senator Moses follows in part:

"From the questions asked by some of the members of your committee, it was strongly intimated that I was pre-disposed in favor of a particular kind of plan. It was likewise suggested that the jury of award was also selected with the same pre-disposition."

"My absolute confidence in the jury of the American peace awards is such that I believe they carried out the purpose of the award and selected the most practicable plan by which the United States may cooperate with other nations to achieve and preserve the peace of the world."

"If, however, you do not share my confidence in Mr. Elihu Root, General James G. Harbord, Colonel Edward M. House, Miss Ellen F. Pendleton, Dean Roscoe Pound, Mr. William Allen White and Mr. Brand Whitlock, I hereby make to your committee the following proposal:

"I will ask (and since the power is theirs, I can only ask) the policy committee of the American peace award that the 22,164 submitted plans be turned over to your committee, either as a committee of the same or as individuals. If, in the judgment of your committee, there is found a more practicable plan than the one selected by the jury named above by which the United States may cooperate with other nations to achieve and preserve the peace of the world, I shall be glad to give to the author of the plan selected by your committee the sum of \$100,000 under the following conditions:

"I. E. Payment to the author of \$50,000 when your committee has selected the better plan and \$50,000 to the author, if and when the plan in substance and intent is approved by the United States senate."

STATE SUPREME COURT PUTS END TO WEMME CASE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—What is doubtless the last echo of the celebrated Wemme estate case in the Oregon supreme court was heard recently when the court handed down an oral opinion denying a motion of Attorneys Tom Mannix and Dan Powers of Portland for a correction of the mandate. The attorneys wanted the mandate changed to remove the limitation of attorney's fees, leaving the fees to be fixed by the judge of the lower court.

Lincoln's Kin Who Faces Trial For Wife-Murder To Plead Self Defense

AURORA, Ill.—The Aurora lawyer, horticulturist and distant relative of Abraham Lincoln who confessed killing his wife because she tried to poison him with "drugged" cocoa, has made self-defense his plea for the mysterious killing which baffled police for nearly a year.

Warren J. Lincoln, to be tried in Chicago for his life, said he only killed his wife after she had shot her own brother, who upbraided her for going out with other men, and had then turned on her husband.

Children of Today Should Live 12 Yrs. Longer G. Parents

FORT WORTH, Texas, Jan. 25.—The children of today will live an average of twelve years longer than their grandmothers, according to Dr. Allan Craig of Chicago, assistant director of the American College of Surgeons, who is here attending a meeting of the Texas-Oklahoma-New Mexico section of the American College of Surgeons.

Quoting figures to show the modern tendency toward longevity, Dr. Craig said that "if we had the same death rate we had in 1880 there would have been 750,000 more deaths in the United States than there were."

Miner to Handle Navy

LONDON, Jan. 25.—(By Associated Press.) Frank Huges, secretary of the miners federation, has been appointed civil lord of the admiralty. It was announced this afternoon. Harry Gosling, president of the National Transport Workers association, is appointed minister of transport.

Apple Growers in Okanogan Have to Pay \$357.95 Acre

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 25.—If the Okanogan (Washington) project is to flourish in the future and pay the government the construction charge plus the operation and maintenance charge, the charge must be based on the actual producing acreage declared E. D. Cluff, the project's attorney, before the reclamation fact-finding commission today.

Mr. Cluff said the apple growers and orchard people would have to pay a total charge of \$357.95 per acre until this was done.

COOLIDGE TO MAKE POLITICAL SPEECH

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—President Coolidge will leave Washington for the first time since he entered the White House last August, when he goes to New York on Lincoln's birthday to speak at the anniversary dinner of the National Republican club. The address is expected to be the first of a political nature he has made since he became president.

Arrangements for the trip have been completed by Charles D. Hilles, republican national committeeman from New York, an officer of the club. The executive, accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge will leave Washington at noon February 12, reach New York about six o'clock, attend the dinner and return at midnight.

MURDER CONFESSION IN KLAMATH ADMITTED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 24.—The first confession of Pablo Montes, accused of the murder of Jose R. Feliz, near Algoma, December 4, was admitted by the court after the question of admissibility had been argued all of yesterday. Testimony was taken by both the state and defense on this question, the defense contending that the confession was obtained under duress and intimidation and that hence the confession should not be admitted.

Opposed to Big Salary For Charles Lobdell

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Confirmation of three members of the federal farm loan board was opposed at public hearings today before the senate banking and currency committee. Those appearing included Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, and Abbe Dole of the Farm Loan association. One basis for opposition is the appointment of Charles E. Lobdell, a former member of the board, as counsel and managing director, at a salary of \$25,000. The commissioners whose nominations are being contested are Merton L. Corey, democrat, Nebraska and Louis J. Pettijohn of Kansas and Elmer S. Landers of Ohio, republican.

JAPAN PLEASED WITH PURCHASE OF AMERICAN LAND

TOKIO, Jan. 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—Japanese authorities today expressed extreme gratification over return of two plots of land in Yokohama formerly held by the United States under foreign perpetual lease-holds all of which are to be extinguished through purchase by the Japanese government. The land has been used as sites for a naval hospital and an army quartermaster's depot.

It was explained today that the government's intention to buy up all foreign perpetual leaseholds eliminating Yokohama as a foreign settlement does not foreshadow any attempt to apply pressure on the foreign lease holders to compel them to part with their property. They will be entirely free to retain possession of the leases which they hold, it was stated.

However, it is believed that the majority of such lease holders have become discouraged, owing to the losses which they suffered in the earthquake and fire in September, and would prefer to accept the government's offer to buy their property than to attempt to rebuild. Few consider restoration and settlement of the residential and business sections of the foreign community of Yokohama as they were before the earthquake disaster a possibility.
