CONDEMNS LENINE BUT NOT RUSSIAN PEOPLE

SPOKANE, Jan. 26.—The United States should not recognize the soviet government or bolshevik government but the United States should recognize the Russian people and use its influence to help the country, was a statement made here today by Peter Virgin, head of the Canadian Doukhobor organization who is a business visitor.

"The only hope for Russia is a republic like the United States," said Mr. Virgin. "If I could send a wire I would ask the people of Russia to condemn the bones of Lenin for the bloodshed and perished people."

Organization of the Medford chapter of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association was effected last night at a meeting in the Chamber of Commerce. J. C. Mann was elected temporary chairman of the meeting and R. W. Paul acted as temporary secretary.

Various details of organization procedure were explained by Edward A. MacLean, secretary of the state association, who came from Portland to attend this meeting. After considerable discussion it was voted unanimously to complete the organization and the uniform code of by-laws drafted by the state association for the government of local chapters was adopted and a meeting was called for Monday evening to elect officers.

Fort Hubbard, A. W. Hubbs and R. W. Paul were named as a nominating committee to report at Monday evening's meeting.

The business of the chapter will be handled by a board of governors consisting of president, vice-president, treasurer and two additional members to be elected Monday and they afterwards will select and employ the secretary.

MEDFORD W. O. W. TO GIVE MINSTRELS TO AID NEW BUILDING

Line W. O. W. camp No. 90, Medford has started preparations for the new building to be erected at the corner of Fifth and Grape.

The architect cooperating with the building committee in the plans has provided specifications to take care of all kinds of entertainments. As a stepping stone to develop the talent that lays dormant in camp 90, at a camp meeting January 3. Neighbor Hurst, who is a promoter of entertainment and in the past has staged several successful home talent minstrel shows for different organizations proposed a plan to stage a W. O. W. minstrel using the talent from camp 90.

On Monday night, January 21st an organization meeting was held and Mr. Hurst selected his talent from the members of the lodge, which will consist of 40 members and a ten-piece orchestra. The minstrel will constitute a two and one-half hour program of music, songs and jokes.

Mr. Hurst is quoted as stating that in all of the shows that he has staged that he has never as yet had as much first class talent to work with as the present talent from camp No. 90, and assures the camp and the public that this minstrel show will be far above anything in the way of a home talent minstrel show ever staged in Medford.

The date for the minstrel as yet has not been set but will probably be some time in February.

The funds derived from this show are to be used towards the erection of this new building and goes to show that the W. O. W. camp No. 90 are live wires and are entitled to the help of every business man and resident in the city of Medford.

This camp has a membership of close to 600 members, and as there is no adequate building in the city to house this large organization and as a result are building their own quarters. A building that not only will be the pride of the organization but a pride to the city and people of Medford as well.

GOLD HILL ASKS FOR NEW BRIDGE OVER THE ROGUE

GOLD HILL, Jan. 26.—(Special)—The regular weekly meeting of the Gold Hill Commercial club was held Tuesday evening in the Gold Hill hotel dining room around festive banquet tables provided by the club entertainment committee and spread by landlord Thomas F. Gillespie of the hotel. A fair number of the members were present with their ladies and all pronounced it the most effective informal meeting recently held. The most important matter disposed of was a long discussion on the unimproved and the unbridged portion of the Pacific Highway in the city which resulted in passing strong resolutions appealing to the county court to take action and in conjunction with the highway commission to have a bridge across Rogue river built and the gap in the highway completed. The most of the evening was taken up in discussing the moral and social conditions in the city and the upbuilding of community advantages.

The Gold Hill Co-operative Development company received a car load of lumber during the week and have assembled the same on the two dwelling house sites on 4th Avenue N. recently purchased by the company from the Charles E. Leland estate. The company's first sale is to a new comer from California, Robert E. Swan, who has purchased one of the above mentioned sites and will have a modern five-room bungalow erected on the site by the company and will occupy it with his family. The Swans recently purchased the Eli Toples ranch on Water Gulch, two miles above Gold Hill and was formerly a resident of lower Applegate in this county some year ago. They say many California families are headed this way and looking for home investments in the Rogue River Valley the coming year.

There is considerable activity in the buying and selling of home properties in Gold Hill the past few days and there will be considerable building done in the city the coming season since the Gold Hill Co-operative Development company has entered the field of shipping car load lots of lumber and building supplies into the city and disposing of same at reasonable prices to builders, besides erecting buildings for prospective home builders.

Mayor Wm. H. Miller takes the lead in buying the John A. Cook dwelling in Riverside addition, Clarence F. Garrett dwelling on First avenue N., and the old Dr. Morrill dwelling on 5th avenue N. He will cut the Cook premises into two tracts and build an additional dwelling thereon, and rebuild the Morrill dwelling. While he has already sold the Garrett premises, known as the Nona Jennings home to Lee Cook of Rock Point who has purchased it for home purposes.

Harry Childers has sold a portion of his home tract in Riverside addition to Ernest T. Ross, who will build the coming season. In the meantime Mr. Childers has built temporary buildings on the Bessie Anderson tract in Riverside addition, which he recently purchased and is now domiciled on the new tract. M. S. Johnson and Frank Childers are acquiring the corner opposite the Kell garage corner on 2nd avenue N., in Gold Hill and propose to erect thereon the coming season a one-story business block with a frontage on 2nd avenue N. of 125 feet and 100 feet deep. Other business buildings and dwellings are being planned for erection the coming season.

Among the visitors to our town last Monday were Mrs. H. W. Ward and her niece Miss Hildred Husen of Medford. Miss Husen was out here visiting her aunt, uncle and other relatives; R. A. Petty and James McCoy and Mrs. Wilford Jacks, as sister-in-law of the late Wilbur Jacks, who came to town to come to Washington and have settled in Reese creek on a farm with one of her brothers, Artie Vestal. I also met Frank Johnson and wife and son Thomas, and while I was talking to them C. O. Thomas joined the company, and about the same time Messrs. J. E. Vetter and S. Williamson of Jacksonville came along and busied themselves circulating petitions to try to secure some of the money set apart for the purpose of fixing the roads and seemed to be succeeding very well, to be applied on the road from Medford to Rich via Jacksonville. Almost everyone wants good roads and seem willing to pay taxes for that purpose.

And speaking of road work we all are of the opinion that when we get a man in as road supervisor and he proves to be the right man in the place that he should be kept there as long as possible, and it seems as tho our county court thinks that we have just the right man in our little town, for I see that it has re-appointed William Perry to succeed himself as the supervisor in this district and enlarged it so as to take in the country north of here as far as the Douglas county line, and added the whole of District No. 6 thus extending it so as to take in both of the Soda Springs, the Dead Indian and the McAllister Springs and in addition to that his district embraces a large territory on Antelope and Dry creeks and on both sides of Rogue river, and to the foot of Rocky hill beyond Derby, and still everybody seems to be pleased with the arrangement, and it could not be surprising if the people put him in as county judge, or have a special law to have our man have charge of the road work in the county. Mr. Perry goes over the roads himself and sees what is needed and appoints a good road builder, and he knows who they are and has them kept in repair, and thus he is kept busy all the time, and so as to be able to do the work thoroughly.

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
