

JACKSONVILLE SUES JACKSON CO. FOR \$6050

An echo of the Bank of Jacksonville failure, for which William H. Johnson, its former cashier, is serving a ten year sentence at state prison, is contained in the docket for the coming session of the circuit court beginning next Monday.

The City of Jacksonville is suing the county treasurer for the return of municipal bonds, given by Johnson, as security for county funds placed on deposit in the defunct establishment. They are valued at \$6050. Jacksonville maintains that Johnson had no right to deliver the bonds as security, and the county treasurer maintains that as custodian of county funds, he has no right to return them. Herbert K. Hanna is acting as attorney for the county seat.

Another case, out of the ordinary, and slated for hearing, is that of Ed Collins, county jailer, against the county of Jackson, for recovery of wages, amounting to between \$600 and \$700. The eight hour law is involved.

Collins, who won local distinction a year ago, by standing up under a cloud from a window weight, in the hands of a prisoner trying to escape, locking the bad man in his cell, and administering a wholesome licking, says that he works a continuous shift, and instead of \$50 per month pay, is entitled to as much more.

County Judge Gardner says he understands the action has been dismissed on the grounds that Collins is a public official, and on duty at all times. "The county," said the county judge, "might be able to turn in a bill for room rent, if the case comes to trial."

At the Monday morning session of the circuit court, Judge C. M. Thomas, set 23 cases, all but one a civil action, many of which, it is said, will be adjudicated out of court. The criminal case is the State of Oregon against C. W. Foeller, charged with possession of intoxicating liquor.

PLAYGROUND IS SUBJECT OF TALK ROTARY LUNCHEON

The value of playgrounds and recreational centers, with particular reference to Medford formed the subject of a very interesting talk before the Medford Rotary club at noon today by Mr. Henderson, in charge of such activities in Portland.

Mr. Henderson proved to be a most fluent and convincing speaker and aroused the Rotarians to genuine enthusiasm. He called attention to the practical value of recreation and playgrounds for both young and old and said that as communities are built not primarily by resources, but by men, so men are built by healthy recreation and wholesome outdoor activities.

Medford, he said, would not need more than two playgrounds and need not go to much expense to provide them with equipment. Not equipment, but supervision, he declared to be the most important point.

In answer to a question by Mayor E. C. Gaddis, the speaker said the army could well be used for civic basketball, volleyball and amateur theatricals, the latter activity being very important in recreational work. Various representatives of local departments interested in the subject were present as guests, including Supt. of Schools Aubrey Smith, City Attorney John Carlin, Mayor Gaddis, and O. C. Boggs head of the city planning commission. George Barker of Butte Falls was also a guest.

Tonight, a delegation of local Rotarians go to Grants Pass in a motor bus where they will meet the Roseburg Rotarians in a general get-together celebration.

ed at the instance of the navy department under Secretary Daniels.

The reference was a proceeding by which congress appropriated \$500,000 for storage construction and authorized the "exchange of oil." This appropriation was inadequate, the senator asserted, to carry out the plans of the navy, which contemplated an expenditure of \$103,000,000 for the purpose of securing tankage storage for its reserve oil.

While Secretary Fall has assumed responsibility for the contracts providing for exchange of royalty crude oil for fuel oil in storage, Senator Lenroot said the committee was unanimous in its belief that the idea originated with Rear Admiral J. K. Robison, chief of the bureau of engineering.

"Admiral Robison is a strong, forceful, aggressive type of officer," he said, "and every member of the committee, I think, was convinced of his sincerity and good faith in this connection regardless of the merits of his proposition."

'TOGGERY BILL' IS INCORPORATED AND FIRM ENLARGED

The widely known local retail business establishment known as "The Toggery" has recently been incorporated under the laws of Oregon with a capital stock of \$15,000, by Wm. F. Isaacs, O. McDearmon and Walter D. Hess.

Starting in a modest way in 1901 in the location now occupied by the Hub shoe store, and with very small capital, with Mr. Isaacs as its owner, it has progressed steadily until now it is one of the largest gentlemen's clothing and furnishing establishments in southern Oregon, not only drawing its large trade from the Medford and Jackson county public, but from all parts of this section of the state and adjacent California.

This business was conducted alone by Mr. Isaacs until about eight or nine years ago when John E. Goodrich became associated with it, and only severed his connection with the establishment last fall when he went to California to reside.

O. McDearmon, until he came here recently to locate, was for 16 years traveling representative for Wilson Bros. of Chicago, claimed to be the largest manufacturer of gentlemen's furnishing goods in the world. It was during his periodical business trips to Medford in past years that Mr. McDearmon became enamored of Medford and its climate, until unable to longer resist the desire to reside here, he and his wife have become permanent residents and he has become solidly anchored in a business way.

Arthur D. Hess, the well known young Medford man who had been associated with The Toggery as clerk for a number of years past, now has a financial interest in it.

JUSTICE OF PEACE KILLED BY TRAIN

HILLSBORO, Ore., Jan. 29.—W. P. Smith, justice of the peace here the past ten years, was killed by Southern Pacific train No. 101 about a mile east of here this morning.

Smith left the tracks when several warning signals had been sounded then stepped back in the path of the train after it was too close to avoid running him down, according to the engineer's report. The justice had been worried about failing health for the past half year or more and was taking one of his morning walks when struck.

Smith had told Mrs. A. Sigler, at whose home he boarded, that he had a premonition that he would die a violent death. A week ago, while getting off a Southern Pacific red electric train he slipped and fell but was not hurt.

His wife had died eighteen years ago, and he had not remarried. His mother died two years ago. He has a brother, Blensten Smith of American Falls, Idaho, and a daughter, Nora Smith, of Forest Grove.

BODIES OF VICTIMS OF 'TACOMA' WRECK ARE SHIPPED HOME

VERA CRUZ, Jan. 28.—(Delayed). (By Radio via Dallas News by the Associated Press). Large crowds witnessed the ceremonies today attending the taking of the bodies of Captain Sparrow of the United States cruiser Tacoma and two radio men killed in an accident aboard the vessel, to the Prometheus, which is carrying the bodies to the states.

Marines from the Prometheus received the bodies from the naval school where they had been with a guard of honor composed of naval cadets. Mexican naval officers accompanied the procession to the dock. The American consul and a large part of the American colony were present.

A hydroplane from the Omaha scattered flowers over the procession. Captain Ambrosio Illades eulogized the three naval men.

The Prometheus will sail Sunday night.

LABOR PREMIER NOT SO ANXIOUS ABOUT RUSSIA RECOGNITION

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Prime Minister MacDonald has met with circumstances which have compelled him to go slower regarding the recognition of Russia by Great Britain than he had intended when he took office, according to some political writers.

The political correspondent of the Daily Mail puts the premier's position as follows:

"It is unlikely that Mr. MacDonald will take any precipitate action towards recognition, permanent officials of the foreign office and an examination of documents on file there having convinced him such a step would not be in the best interests of the country. He is anxious for recognition as soon as possible and is engaged in making the necessary preliminary inquiries."
