M'NARY BILL IS EXPLAINED BY MAN WHO DRAFTED IT

PENDELTON, Ore., Jan. 29.—Charles J. Brand, for many years chief of the United States bureau of markets and now consulting specialist to Henry C. Wallace, secretary of agriculture and also head of the packers and stockyards administration, discussed the work of the department intended to help the livestock industry, but by the request of convention authorities confined most of his remarks to the McNary-Haugen bill.

Speaking of the livestock industry in general Brand discussed the work of the packers and stockyards act in the attempt to bring about fair competition and open markets. He declared in favor of co-operative marketing and stated that the practice tended toward the reduction of abuses.

Mr. Brand declared that the McNary-Haugen bill is not necessarily an administration measure but that it is the one Secretary Wallace has approved as being most likely to help the fundamental difficulties now experienced by the American farmer, especially with relation to wheat and pork products.

Mr. Brand who drafted the bill which he said contains the ideas of Secretary Wallace, Senator McNary and Representative Haugen, explained how the ratio price for purchase in the economic market would be fixed and how existing agencies would be used in the grain trade.

MEDFORD TO GET A GLOVE FACTORY, FREE SITE GIVEN

It developed at the city council meeting last night that Medford is to have a new industry in the States Glove Manufacturing company, which has just been formed and incorporated under the laws of Oregon from the old Denver Glove Manufacturing company of Denver, Colo., and of which the heaviest stockholders are Dr. Frank Roberts, well known dentist, and his brother-in-law, Mr. Carpenter, and which will be removed to this city.

Dr. Roberts in setting forth this information before the council last night asked that body on behalf of the company to donate a site at once for the new concern. That is all the company asks from the city, the site to revert back to the city if at any time the company ceases to operate here. A site of only 40 by 80 feet was asked for, and the company plans to build a frame structure about that size with foundations which will enable the company, as it enlarges, to add one or more floors.

The company also plans, when the growth of the business warrants it, to establish its own tannery in connection with the factory, and when that time comes the tannery would be established in another location outside the city. The work of erecting the one story factory building will be begun at once and the machinery removed to this city from the former Denver plant as fast as the railroads can bring it.

The new concern will only bring one family to the city with the factory plant and during the early stages of the first year of its existence here will employ about fifteen persons. But if it sustains a normal growth, as its owners confidently expect, will employ many more persons by the end of that time.

Mayor Gaddis and the councilmen were unanimously in favor of furnishing the new site to the company under the conditions volunteered by Dr. Roberts, and finally decided to give the 50x100 lot at the corner of Welch and Jackson streets as the site. This is one of the pieces of delinquent property that has fallen to the city through unpaid assessments amounting to about \$674.

NO DECISION IN DEBATE ON LOS ANGELES-MEDFORD

Is Medford a better place in which to live than Los Angeles? This question was the subject for debate by four high school students, members of Miss Pett's English class at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon at the Hotel Medford today. Keva Hutchinson and Harold Fish, for the affirmative and John Holsang and Eugene Thomas for the negative debated this question heatedly amid applause and laughter of the large number gathered to hear them. Los Angeles seemed to be proved more amusing with more advantages for commerce and education but Medford was declared more "safe and sane." The city police force, fire department, theaters, lighting system and schools were criticized and praised by turns and the presence of Mayor Gaddis, "Judge" Glen Taylor, H. L. Walther of Copco company, Superintendent of Schools Aubrey Smith, to hear these arguments made it doubly interesting.

No decision was given at the end of

the debate but an inquiry among those present brought forth the fact that though Los Angeles might be the first place on earth, Medford was the town for them.
