DEMOCRATS TO HAVE TICKET IN LOCAL PRIMARY

The long dormant democracy of Jackson county plans on putting a full ticket in the field for the spring primary, and an impromptu meeting was held Tuesday to talk over the situation, and discuss candidates. The following slate was advanced as being a winner.

For county judge—Frank Wortman of Phoenix.

For county commissioner—William Ulrich.

For representative—Miles Cantrall of Ruch, another one to be picked.

For sheriff—L. M. Schemerhorn.

No candidates for assessor or treasurer, with endorsement of J. B. Coleman and A. C. Walker, incumbents and candidates for re-election.

So far, so good.

Now comes this morning William Ulrich, well known and highly successful businessman of southern Oregon, announcing his candidacy for county judge, blissfully oblivious of the state. Friends have urged "Uncle Bill" to run for weeks. About the urging there has been no campaign claptrap. They have urged him. And he has consented to make the race on a platform guaranteeing business like administration of county affairs, reduction in taxes, without hamstringing road or school development, and elimination of divided authority, and additional expenses in the sheriff's office. Efficient and proper enforcement of the prohibition law is promised, but "you can't do a good job of it with a brass band," says Mr. Ulrich, vowing to abolish the brass band attachment, if he is elected.

The entry of Mr. Ulrich may result in Frank Wortman being substituted for county commissioner. A few years ago Mr. Wortman ran for the legislature, but was beaten.

The candidates for sheriff and representative, possess a chronic diffidence about running for office, but this will be smashed, say the leaders. Cantrall is a prominent farmer of the Applegate district, active in the security of the Ruch-Medford road, with a host of friends, and every campaign for years has found him "talked of" for some office.

Schemerhorn is also a farmer, well known and popular, a resident of the valley for many years, and in his youth a detective connected with the Pinkerton agency, and later a special agent of the Southern Pacific.

WORK STARTS ON HOTEL ADDITION

Actual construction work upon the one-story addition to the Hotel Medford, entailing an expenditure of \$50,000 when the improvement is finished, has begun, and material is now being hauled to the ground for the work. Contractor Merritt has a force of men at work building scaffolds, etc., preparatory to beginning on the main job. The addition will give the Hotel Medford, accommodation for 150 more people daily, and make it the most complete and modern small city hotel in the state. It will be 27 rooms, all modern, with baths, and ten with shower baths. The addition was made necessary by the increased general and tourist travel. An express elevator will also be installed. It is the plan to finish the work to completion, and have the enlarged Hotel Medford open to the public by June 1st.

LUKE WARM RELIGION IS DENOUNCED BY EVANGELIST HUGHES

Hughes makes copious use of scripture and he laid down a general challenge to anyone to show that he is unchristian in his preaching. He hews close to the fundamentals of religious faith, according to the pastor of the church.

An increased attendance heard the evangelist last night and as has been the case for many months large numbers of men attend his meetings. The morning and afternoon services were also well attended yesterday. Unlike many evangelists he gives no time to preliminaries and sensational plays, but on the contrary holds his audiences with his intense earnestness and business like application of religion to all manner of living and thinking.

Tonight he will speak upon the subject, "Something Entirely New," at the 7:30 service. The spirited song service of a half hour preceding the evangelist's address is becoming increasingly popular. Day meetings at 9:45 and 2:30 again Thursday.
