

RAWLES MOORE'S CHANCE TO SPEAK DELAYED FOR YEAR

Rawles Moore, the former district attorney of Jackson county, and Fred L. Heath returned home Tuesday from Portland where last Friday and Saturday they attended the annual state meeting of the district attorneys.

Mr. Moore, although he resigned the office some time ago because of his objection to Governor Pierce having appointed a special prosecutor in liquor cases in this county, and therefore was not now a member of the state body, went to that convention with blood in his eye and a determination to relate the facts in detail of how the governor came to appoint a special prosecutor, and the controversy between him and the governor over this appointment.

It will be remembered that the news dispatches of this convention showed that the assembled district attorneys showed a strong sentiment against the governor's appointing special prosecutors. Mr. Moore had planned to take the floor immediately after the governor had addressed the assemblage in regular meeting, and speak out his mind and show things up generally about what he termed the governor's unwarranted interference in the affairs of the Jackson county prosecutor's office during his regime, and later for a few weeks after Newton Borden had taken the office, and the governor finally heeding the protest of District Attorney Borden and discharging the special liquor violation prosecutor.

However, Governor Pierce did not address the convention at one of its regular sessions, as expected and merely attended the formal dinner of the body at which he made an address regarding the searching of homes.

The next forenoon when the convention resumed its sessions the governor-special prosecutor question was discussed, and the gathering became quite heated—so much so that a motion to adjourn to cool off prevailed.

On reconvening that afternoon the question was again discussed and a motion was made by a small minority of the governor's adherents to allow no one but the members of the convention to make addresses, and to confine each speech to five minutes.

This motion was eventually aimed at Mr. Moore and finally prevailed with the five minutes limitation clause, but permitted the Jackson county man to speak.

The verbally loaded former district attorney of this county then arose, thanked the convention for its courtesy in allowing him to speak but stated that he was so full of vehement utterance and details that he could not begin to discuss the subject in five minutes talk. Then he sat down.

Later the district attorney's convention elected Rawles Moore a life member of the state district attorneys' association, as they did George Neuner, Jr., the former Roseburg district attorney. Hence Mr. Moore at the next meeting of the convention can attend as a member and get the chance then to square accounts with the governor.

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INDIANA GOVERNOR IS DECLARED BANKRUPT

FRANKFORT, Ind., Jan. 30.—Governor Warren T. McCray is adjudged a bankrupt in the report of Harry C. Sheridan, federal master in chancery, who recently conducted a hearing on the petition of three Fort Wayne banks. The report was made public here today.

In the report Mr. Sheridan held that McCray is not a farmer nor a laborer and therefore not exempt from the federal laws governing involuntary bankruptcy proceedings.

Big Suit Is Dismissed.
NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Federal Judge Augustus N. Hand today dismissed the \$5,250,000 suit brought by Max Hurl, bookmaking agent, against the E. F. Keith Theatrical Exchange, Inc., and others for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

DEFENDS DANIELS AS ORIGINATOR OF OIL LEASE PLAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The house today debated oil lease foreclosures. Representatives Byrnes, democrat, Tennessee, started the discussion by reading a telegram from former Secretary Daniels of the navy department, taking issue with a statement by Representative Longworth, the republican leader, that the former secretary suggested the policy which made possible the leasing of the oil fields.

After quoting from the message of Mr. Daniels, which said he had refused every proposition to lease the reserves, Mr. Byrnes declared the former navy department head had stood like a stone wall against the efforts of exploiters.

"Yet, two months after he had left the cabinet," added Mr. Byrnes, "his successor—I was tempted to say in collusion with—Secretary Fall, turned over these reserves to private interests with a result that we now find ourselves facing a shameful situation."

Chairman Sniott of the public lands committee, replied that nevertheless by urging amendment of the law to permit the leasing of reserves, Mr. Daniels "threw down the bars."

MORO FANATICS ARE FEARLESS, BUT RIFLE COOLS THEIR ARDOR

MANILA, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press). Religious fanatics who have been causing trouble in Surigao province, island of Mindanao, are dispersing rapidly according to a report received from there this morning. It is reported there are nearly 15,000 fanatics scattered throughout various parts of the province in small bands which may assemble under leaders who obtain money through promises to heal, from the ignorant natives. It is feared these bands may commit further depredations.

Lieutenant Colonel Clarence H. Bowers, commander of the constabulary opposing the fanatics, believes his forces, strengthened by recent reinforcements rushed to Surigao from other sections of the islands now are sufficient to keep the fanatics scattered.

Although armed only with bolos and clubs, the fanatics are fearless in fighting the well equipped constabulary soldiers, the advice here state. They believe that by the use of certain elements which they place on their body, that they are proof against the bullets of their foes.

SKI MARATHON IS WON BY NORWAY

CHAMONIX, France, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press). Thoralf Heig, Norwegian skiing star, won the ski marathon race in the Olympic winter sports today. Twenty-four ski marathons, representing France, Latvia, Poland, and Hungary, engaged in a jaunt of fifty kilometers across the mountain passes and valleys. The American ski team, although regularly entered, decided not to start in the marathon as they only reached town yesterday and are in poor condition. They feared the effort of the long race might prejudice their chances in the ski jumps in which they are especially anxious to make a good showing.

COCO COLA KING'S BREACH PROMISE TRIAL IS STARTED

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 30.—Indicating the line of defense in the \$500,000 suit filed against Asa G. Candler, Sr., Atlanta, by Mrs. Onezima De Bouchel of New Orleans, for alleged breach of promise, attorneys for Mr. Candler filed with United States Judge Samuel H. Sibley today an amendment to the original answer asserting that at the time of Mr. Candler's engagement to marry the New Orleans woman, she was legally married to Adelphie Roquet of New Orleans.

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 30.—With ventriemen present and preparations completed to accommodate as large a crowd as possible in the court room, the trial of the suit of Mrs. Onezima DeBouchel of New Orleans against Asa G. Candler, Sr., Atlanta soft drink magnate, was expected to get under way, promptly with the opening of United States district court here today.

Mrs. DeBouchel is suing Mr. Candler for \$500,000 for alleged breach of promise.

Selection of the jury was expected to proceed rapidly.

Mrs. DeBouchel, charging in her petitions that Mr. Candler broke his engagement to marry her as the result of alleged information given him to the effect that two men had visited her in her room in a hotel at night during a confederate reunion in Atlanta in October, 1919, seeks vindication of the alleged charges.

She stated that she asked Mr. Candler to furnish her the names of the informants and that he refused. She denied the alleged charges.

Mr. Candler in his answer said he did not make any charges against Mrs. DeBouchel but merely conveyed to her the information he had received.

L. FIRPO BREAKS WITH RICKARD IN FIGHT WITH WILLS

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 30.—Luis Angel Firpo has received a cablegram from Tex Rickard advising him not to sign a contract with any other promoter until he had had further negotiations with Rickard.

Firpo asserted that in view of his acceptance of the offer of Lewis Raymond for a fight with Harry Wills, there was nothing he could say in reply to Rickard unless the Raymond negotiations should fall through.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Luis Firpo will have a double financial interest in his fight with Harry Wills next July. Besides his \$250,000 guarantee, with privilege of \$500,000 cent of the net receipts, he also will have an interest in the special stadium which is to be constructed by a newly formed syndicate with which the Argentine has cast his lot.

Daughter Not Worried

NAVAL MEN WILL INVESTIGATE U. S. OIL LEASES ALSO

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—An inquiry of its own into some features of the Sinclair and Doheny oil leases was begun today by the house naval committee with Rear Admirals Latimer, Gregory and Griffin, ready to testify.

Admiral Gregory, chief of the navy department's bureau of yards and docks, related how as part of its contract with the government in connection with the California naval oil lease the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport Company, Doheny concerns had built at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, tanks for storage of 1,500,000 barrels of oil.

These tanks, he said, had been completed and are filled with oil. Under a supplemental agreement, it was added, construction is under way at Pearl Harbor of seventeen additional tanks, each of a capacity of 150,000 barrels nine gasoline tanks of 225,000 gallons each and 56 tanks for storage of lubricating oil, each capable of holding 25,000 gallons.

All of the tank construction work at Pearl Harbor, said Admiral Gregory, will be completed by the end of the year.

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
