Registration books are now open for the primary and general elections, and registrars for the principal cities and towns have been named as follows by the county clerk:

The total vote of Jackson county, according to the registration books is 6464; divided as follows: Republicans 6118; democrats, 2921; prohibitionist, 82; socialists, 195; and 438 who have no political affiliations.

The banner prohibition registration is from Ashland Boulevard precinct with 13, and the high socialist registration is from Trail with 19, closely followed by Union with nine.

In this city, Southwest and West Medford precincts are tied with three voters of the socialist faith. Southeast Medford is leader in avowed prohibitionists, with a total of three, and Oakdale and Southeast precincts are tied for second honors, with two each.

SCHOOL INSTITUTE TO BE HELD HERE SATURDAY, FEB. 9

The next local institute in the county will be held in Medford on Saturday, February 9, at the high school building, beginning at 9:30.

Every teacher in the county has a most cordial invitation to attend. State Superintendent Churchill will give an address in the morning at 10 o'clock on "Preparing for Eighth Grade Examinations" and in the afternoon at 3 o'clock, "Some Measurements for the Teacher's Efficiency." Supt. Churchill desires to meet in special sessions all high school teachers. Dr. Thos. Gentile of the State Normal School will also be here as instructor and speaker. Needless to advertise Dr. Gentile. We all know him.

The January eighth grade examinations were written upon by 56 pupils in the various schools of the county. Jackson county has three unusual schools in that they consist wholly of boys. The Hatchery school with 12 pupils, the Pilot Rock school with 3, and the Dead Indian school with five are the ones where boys abound. The 5th grade in the Jacksonville school is also wholly a boys' brigade.

Lost Creek school district has the distinction of being managed by women. Records show that in the year 1918, a revolution occurred—bloodless, we are told—and at the annual school meeting in June that year four women were installed as directors and clerk. Their reign has evidently been approved from year to year, for in each June since women have been selected. The women, thus serving as Mrs. Anna Tonn as clerk for five years, while Mrs. O. E. Hagedale, Mrs. Chas. Seefeld, Mrs. C. R. Moore, Mrs. Edith Jones and Mrs. Anna Rohrer, have served various terms as directors.

Jackson county stands 9th in the state as to proportion of school population attending school daily, according to ranking of the various counties as just sent out by Supt. Churchill. Multnomah stands first; Curry and Harney, 35th and 36th.

Three new school wells have recently been sunk—in Provoia district, Meadows district and Table Rock. The last named district has had a well for years, but was seeking for better water.

District 27, Uniontown, has a new organ. Why should not every school have some musical instrument? Two clubs are organized in Independence school—a sewing club and a poultry club.

When we enjoy such a community program as the men of Table Rock supplied on last Friday evening, we just wish all our school communities might have heard it and caught the inspiration. The women of the Table Rock club will show what they can do on the evening of February 22.

Winter weather does not trouble Jackson county children. Witness, 100 per cent attendance for November in Persist school and 100 per cent for December in Mt. Pitt school, Butte Creek and Laurelhurst schools, while North Trail school, consisting of four pupils had perfect attendance during September, November, and December. However, the Little Applegate school of four boys caps the record with 100 per cent attendance for the four months of school from September to January.

It is gratifying to find a high per cent of attendance for many of our schools. 99 per cent or over is recorded for Lake Creek, Meadows, Wagner Creek and Prospect schools for either November or December. While Phoenix, Lone Pine, Willow Springs, Agate, Missouri Flat, North Phoenix, Uniontown, Sterling, Savage Creek, Watkins, Oak Grove, Elk Creek, Beaver Creek and Howard schools all stand above 95 per cent. Then Jacksonville, Rosedale, Anderson Creek, Butte Falls, and Moon's can schools all register 97 per cent or above.

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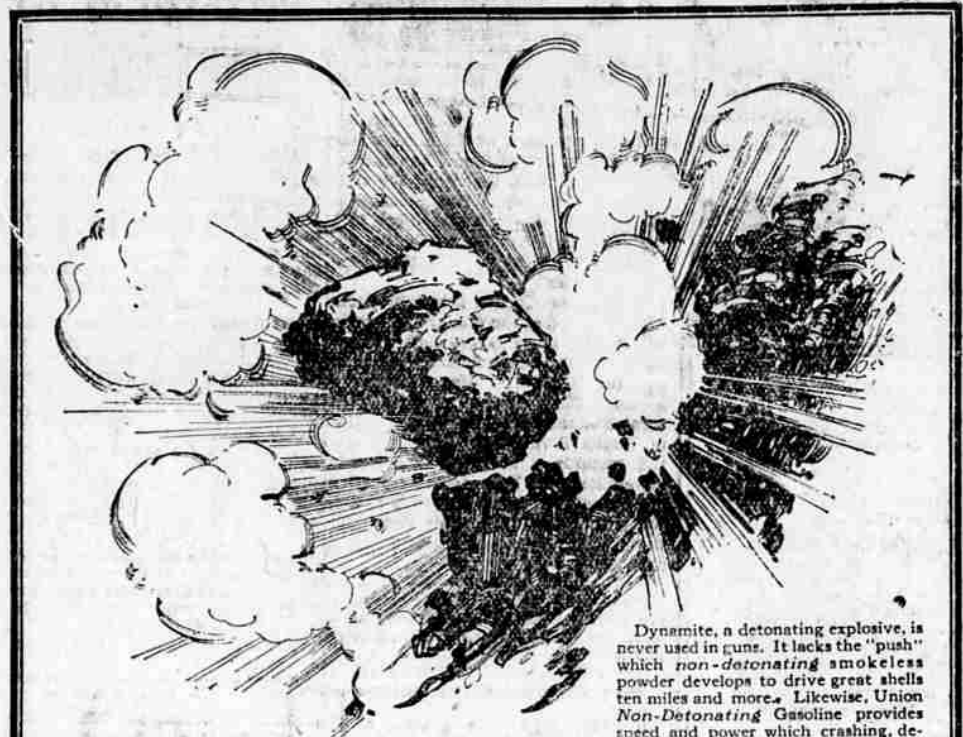
