In Memorium

Andromeda Hurst Charley
Andromeda Hurst Charley was born in 1836 in Harrison county, Indiana, the youngest daughter of Nimrod and Mary Pennington Hurst, and died in Ashland January 27th, 1924, aged 88 years. She was married to William Charley, (born in Harrison county, Ind., in 1832.) in 1852. She and her husband at once moved to Keokuk, Iowa, where they lived until 1855. They next moved to Omaha, Neb., where they lived one year, then to Elkhorn City, Neb., where another year was spent. In 1858, they returned to Corydon, Ind., where they settled a half mile east of the present home of John Wheat. The house is now gone. In 1861 her husband enlisted in the Civil war and served to the end.
In 1867 they again started westward and stopped at Mason City, Iowa, for three years. From there they next moved to Red Oak in southwest Iowa where they spent three years in town and three years on a farm. In 1876

they moved to Jackson county, Oregon where a brother, Martin F. Hurst, had settled some twenty years before. For the first ten years they rented land and then bought a homestead near Climax, Oregon, where fourteen years of their lives were spent.

In 1900 they moved to Medford, Ore., where they lived up to the time of her husband's death, which occurred November 19, 1920. Of the five children, their names are as follows: Nimrod Newell Charley, born at Keokuk, Iowa; Lemon Case, born at Omaha, Neb.; Cassius Clay and Woodford Merrill, born near Corydon, Ind.; Minnie Evaline, born at Mason City, Ill. All are living and have families except Cassius Clay, who died, leaving a wife and three children, and Woodford who recently died in Medford.

Mrs. Charley has two cousins living on her father's side, Mrs. Chas. F. Stevens, of Corydon, Junction, Ind., and Woodford Keyple, Independence, Mo.

This we have a glimpse of a descendant of two of the earliest families connected with the history of Harrison county, Indiana, whose forefathers came into the country in 1806.
