AMERICANIZATION SHOULD BEGIN AT HOME, WOMEN TOLD

"It is necessary to Americanize ourselves before we begin to Americanize others." This was the theme of the talk given by Mrs. Rose Schefflin before the red letter day meeting of the Greater Medford club Wednesday afternoon at St. Marks hall. "This country is governed by default not by the people," said Mrs. Schefflin. "Out of 36 states only 10 states voted over 50 per cent of their registered vote and some states were as low as 10 per cent and 8 per cent," said Mrs. Schefflin, and she advised the women of the organization to take up the course of study prescribed by the state federation of women's clubs, and went on to say, "We need not fear the foe from without but the foe from within, and this foe within ourselves is not the radical element but our own indifference."

The Rev. D. J. Howe spoke on the ideals of education and declared that in his opinion religion should not be taught in our public schools but that no infidels should be allowed to teach in them.

A sum of \$173 was on the near tree for the Scholarship Loan Fund, a great advance over the sum raised last year.
