SAMS VALLEY, Jan. 31.—The petition lately circulated through our district for the paved road from Medford to Ruch got several signers from here through the false impression it carried. Many who soon discovered that it was misleading in its intent, regretted very much that their names were attached to it, but anxiously awaited the wise judgment of our county court in its action upon the matter.

The Powers Coos Bay Lumber Co. was again buying livestock through our community, being represented by Albert Powers, Jr., and the Powers Co. buying agent, Mr. Miller. They succeeded in purchasing two carloads of stock in this and surrounding districts. The buyers paid a good price for the purchases they made and left our farmers well pleased with their sales.

A literary program will be held at the school house Friday, February 8. Several good numbers are being prepared, among them a debate by six of the men of the community.

PETITION SIGNERS IN TABLE ROCK ARE SORRY THEY SIGNED

TABLE ROCK, Jan. 31.—Two Jacksonville residents were through here last week circulating petitions for the paving of the Medford-Jacksonville road. They claimed that the money was on hand and lying idle; also that the county court was getting ready to pave the Ruch road and it would be a matter of economy to pave the strip between Medford and Jacksonville while the plant was in operation.

Listening to these statements many people signed the petitions who since learning the facts would gladly withdraw their names.

Why Ruch back in the hills needs a paved road while many districts in the valley yearly haul thousands of tons of produce over rough dirt roads is a mystery hard to solve.

All the fat hogs in this section were gathered last Monday by the Smith-Powers Lumber Co. and shipped to their plant at Coos Bay. The price paid was about a cent below the Portland market and was much appreciated by our farmers who have heretofore been forced to sell at a much lower price.

Farm products in this section are moving very slow at the present time and farmers are not feeling very jubilant over the future prospects.

Despite the efforts of our price slashing governor and the working of the state income tax it is said by those who have "peeked in" that taxes will be very little lower this year.

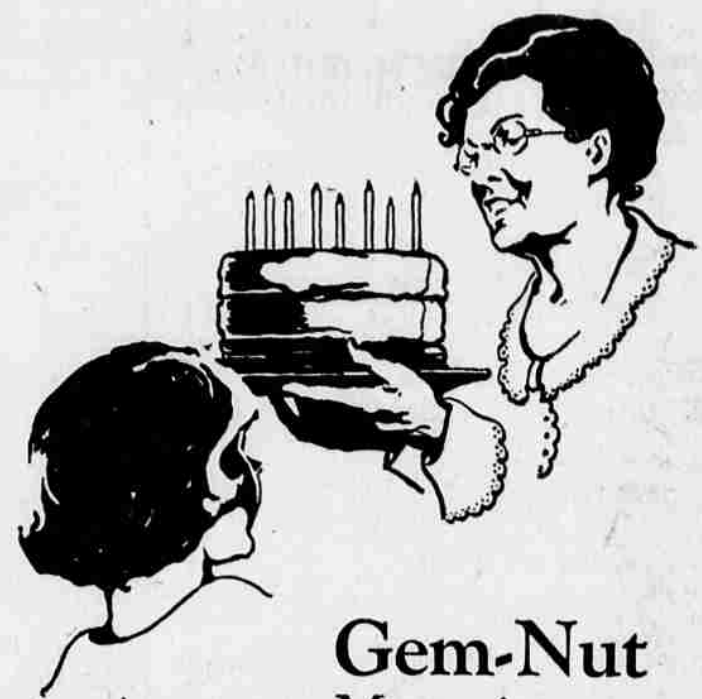
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DIRECTIONS
