CENTRAL POINT, Feb. 2.—Yesterday witnessed the change in management of the local telephone exchange. O. In his new position he is to be successful in giving forth the telephone using public the best service, as has been given heretofore. While they have been here they made many friends, not only through their gentleness, but also the fine service they gave the telephone subscribers. Telephone service will be given the subscribers on week-days from the hours 7:30 a. m. till 5:30 p. m. On Sunday service will only be given on the hours from 8 a. m. till 11 a. m., and then in the evenings from 5:30 till 8:30. In the night when the operators are not on duty a call system is used, so that if individual calls after the regular hours are turned in a charge of twenty-five cents is made for each call.

MAKE PLANS FOR FARM CONFERENCE NEXT MONDAY P. M.

Preliminary steps will be taken next Monday afternoon for the contemplated Jackson county agricultural program by those who attended the conference at Corvallis last week. An executive committee will be selected who will be in charge of the conference of farmers and business men that will be held in this county during the week of February 18.

The plan is to have group meetings of farmers interested in dairying, livestock, farm crops, poultry, horticulture and land settlement. Each one of these groups will have a technical advisor from the Oregon agricultural college and the program to be made up will be directly applicable to Jackson county. The state agricultural program adopted at Corvallis of each topic and will be exceedingly helpful in making up the local program.

Every one of these groups will have important parts in the conference but the one in which both the farmers and business men will find of greatest importance is that of land settlement. With the hundreds of thousands of dollars that are to be spent in advertising the Pacific northwest, and particularly Oregon, during the next three or four months will bring into Oregon one million tourists and taking the California figures as to the proportion that will remain as permanent residents, the state of Oregon will be increased in population by one hundred thousand during 1924. As the greatest number of tourists enter the state from California, this county has the first chance to sell themselves to these tourists and directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce under whose auspices the conference is being held, are exceedingly anxious that every business man and farmer gets interested in the conference and aid in getting a constructive program into operation.

"Charles Wacker, 15 year old lad of Scott Valley, says he never really did believe one's hair could stand on end and his heart stand still, until his experience last Monday in the timber when as he made his way through the heavy brush, he saw it part and a young mountain lion come into sight," says the Yreka Journal.

"Before he could really grasp what to do, for he feared the mother near, the brush again parted and the old one and two more kittens came into view. She looked but a second at the boy, whipped her tail on the ground, then crouched to spring, having tensed her muscles. Charles took aim and fired just as the lion sprang and she landed at his feet dead. The bullet he fired had taken effect, he having shot into her mouth as she opened it when she sprang. It was a close call. Only a clear brain, a steady hand and a good aim saved him.

"Charles chased the kittens, now that the mother was dead and now has them at his home. Near where he encountered the lion lay the carcass of a doe on which no doubt the lion family had been feeding when disturbed by the approach of the lad."
