UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 2.—(Special). Five radio lectures of timely interest, prepared in a popular manner by experts from the University of Oregon, will be broadcasted from Station KGW (The Oregonian), Portland during the month of February.

Dr. Warren D. Smith, professor of geology, one of the foremost authorities on the geology and geography of the western world, will speak over the radio Friday (Feb. 1) on "Earthquakes of the Pacific." The subject has timely interest because of the recent disaster in Japan.

"The Bok Peace Plan" will be discussed by Walter C. Barnes, professor of history, Feb. 8.

"The Tax Situation," an address by Dr. James H. Gilbert, professor of economics, is scheduled for Feb. 15. "Portraits of Washington" by Prof. F. S. Dunn, head of the department of Latin, falls on Washington's birthday. Prof. Dunn has made an extensive collection of the portraits of the first president, many of them little known.

"Tests and Measurements in Education" has been chosen by Dr. C. A. Gregory, professor of education, as the subject for Feb. 22. Dr. Gregory is the author of a well-known book on the subject.
