Editor Edgar Piper Sends Regrets to The Lincoln Club

Editor Edgar B. Piper, of the Oregonian, writing to the Jackson County Lincoln club invitation committee, regretting his inability to attend the banquet this year says:

I have thought from year to year that it would be possible for me to accept an invitation so regularly extended by you. But it has not been easy to arrange. SOFT DRINK CASE BEING HEARD IN J'VILLE TODAY

Soft drink dispensers of southern Oregon were the principal witnesses at the trial of the American Soda Fountain company against the Medford Grocery company, for payment of \$4400, for delivery of syrups used in the making of summer drinks. The case is the first on the docket at the recessed term of court, which opened Monday. The plaintiff is represented by Attorneys Boggs and Flaegel, and the defense by Attorneys Neff and Kelley. A previous trial of the action resulted in a verdict by a jury for the defense in the sum of \$250, a new trial being granted.

The soft drink dispensers corroborated the contention of the defense, that the goods were inferior in quality, the proprietor of the Blue Bird confectionery in Klamath Falls, saying that one of his customers, served with a drink, in which lemon juice was used, remarked while sipping it, "this is a rotten drink." Others also said things similar, so the Blue Bird proprietor went down in the cellar and investigated, and threw some out, and sent some back for credit on account. Grants Pass and Ashland business men also testified on the same subject.

The grocery firm also alleges that the goods were ordered for early delivery, but did not arrive till summer. The original price was \$5894.25, payable one-half on delivery and one-half in sixty days. The plaintiff is a Boston, Mass., firm.

The case is expected to last two or three days.

The court requested that all attorneys having cases pending at this session of court report, in order to rearrange the docket.

SHIP BUILDERS CAN'T RECOVER FROM U. S. A. CANCELLED CONTRACTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5.—Ship builders cannot recover from the United States shipping board emergency fleet corporation on claims for cancellation of war contracts, but must apply direct to the United States government for relief, according to an opinion handed down in federal court today by Judge Bean.

The opinion was given in overruling a demurrer by the Astoria Marine Iron Works in its case against the fleet corporation. Judge Bean held that the corporation, though an agent of the United States government and could not be held privately responsible for more than any office can be held responsible for any acts performed in line of duties under authority conferred upon him by the government and relief must be sought from the federal government.

Chicago Gas Price Raised.
CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—An increase of two cents in the price of gasoline and an advance of one cent in the price of kerosene, effective tomorrow, was announced today by the Standard Oil company of Indiana.

GREAT VIOLINIST TO GIVE CONCERT HERE FEBRUARY 13

Renes Chemet, who plays here Wednesday, Feb. 13th, has been universally acclaimed as one of the greatest violinists of the world. "Second only to Kreisler is Chemet" is the manner in which Henry Finck, the veteran music critic of the New York Evening Post, described her. Mme. Chemet is French by birth and comes from a little village where she used to walk eight miles back and forth to her music lessons, as a child. Since then she has toured Europe extensively and made her first American tour last season. Mme. Chemet has recently been greatly honored by the National opera of France. This organization has built a vault in Paris into which have been deposited the recorded works of the greatest of present-day musicians. This "caveau" will remain closed for an entire century, at the end of which the records will be taken forth and played to the people of that time. The ceremony of interring some works of Saint-Saens and records of Caruso has been observed and the directors honored Mme. Chemet by including some of her violin records in the now hermetically sealed urn. Mme. Chemet comes here as the third visiting attraction of the Civic Music club. Her recital will be given at the First Presbyterian church.
