When the body of ex-President Wilson was lowered in the grave today "raps" was sounded by the Associated Press, and the Mail Tribune with all other A. P. newspapers suspended operations for two minutes in respect to the dead. The Medford banks closed during the burial this afternoon. The postoffice closed from 2:30 to 3:30 o'clock, though the mail carriers made their regular deliveries, most of the stores closed during the hour of the funeral.
