The trumpet was again to be heard today in soldier farewells as the body was lowered to its tomb.

On both sides of the entrance to the chapel were great set pieces of the floral tributes, flanking the way to the door through which the casket would pass on "the way to peace," as

van the legend graven in the stone arch of the doorway. As at the residence, there were great mountains of flowers banking the walls.

Floral Display Tremendous.
Within the chapel flowers had been massed on both sides of the altar and along the altar rails. To the left of the altar itself, standing back in a recess lighted by stained glass windows, the flag stood, a military standard swinging free on its staff, with no mourning band.

Along the entrance corridor to the chapel the wreaths and floral pieces were set in a wonderful array of beauty. On one wall hangs a mighty wreath of red and white roses, more than seven feet across. It was sent from New York to express the sympathy and the gratitude of the Polish people of New York. Nearby was the flag of France, done in fragrant blossoms, and from some of the embassies had come the coats of arms of the nations, made up in flowers, while about the chapel or the corridor were grouped the offerings of the other diplomatic missions.

Chairs had been set for the distinguished few who might witness the ceremony and they more than half covered the floor of the chapel. On the back of the chapel where the organ pipes are set in, flush with stone work, blossoms had been woven into the sculptured decorations that tell the story of the birth of Christ.

Meantime, an hour before the service at the home was to begin, several thousand persons were gathered in the street which was lined on each side by marines and infantrymen.

They had come to get a fleeting glimpse of the start of the funeral procession to Mount St. Albans. The assemblage grew with every minute, despite gathering clouds and threat of snow.

Lodge and Taft III.
A sudden attack of illness prevented Chief Justice Taft from taking his place among the honorary pall-bearers and Senator Lodge bent word that a throat attack would make it impossible for him to act as a member of the committee so Senator Charles S. Hamlin, former governor of the federal reserve board; Robert Bridges of New York, a classmate of Mr. Wilson and Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson, the friend and physician of years, were added to the corps of honorary pall-bearers.

As Mr. Wilson's body was placed in the casket, a blanket of orchids, the tribute of American soldiers in the World war, was placed upon it and remained the only floral offering in that place of pre-eminence during the day.

The guard of honor of 24 service men arrived at two o'clock and took up its station just outside the front door, standing in double file, headed by eight soldiers dressed in khaki uniforms and overcoats. Eight sailors were next in blue sailor hats and blue jackets and then the eight marines immediately behind dressed in field green uniforms and overcoats, with white gloves.

Three secret service men who served at the White House during the Wilson administration, also arrived shortly after two o'clock to take their place among those who were to do the last ministrations for the dead
