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COURSE ON ART OF JUDGING MEN STARTS THURSDAY

An intensive evening course covering four weeks opens Thursday at the Medford Business College. FARM PROBLEM IS FORUM SUBJECT ASHLAND C. OF C.

ASHLAND, Feb. 6.—The weekly forum luncheon was held by the Chamber of Commerce at the Hotel Ashland Tuesday noon. The main speaker for the noon was C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter. Mr. Chapman gave a complete resume of the conference held at Corvallis during the last week. This report was quite a bit more general than the reports given at last week's forum. B. E. Harder, president of the Medford Chamber of Commerce spoke in regard to the tourist question during the next year. H. L. Walther of Medford also gave a short talk, stressing the point of co-operation between the farmers and business men. He also told of the agricultural-economic conference which will be held in Medford soon. This will be a continuation of the conference held in Corvallis. H. B. Rankin, forest supervisor of the Crater National Forest, also spoke on the reforestation problem. The members of the high school debating team, consisting of Bernard Joy and Earl Nutter as affirmative, and Roland Parks as negative, were guests of the forum. Among those from Medford who attended the luncheon, A. S. Rosenbaum, H. O. Frobach, secretary Medford C. of C.; Colonel C. G. Thompson, superintendent Crater National park; Wm. Warner and Kater the magician, who spent the day in Ashland after his performance at the Armory Monday evening.

The Klamath stages are doing heavy work during this time, it sometimes being necessary to take two stages for all the passengers and mail. Mail is being carried to Klamath Falls twice a day now, in accordance with the new schedule which has recently gone into effect. Mr. Howard is the manager of the stage line, and handles the business in large sedans, which make the traveling to Klamath Falls at this time, much more enjoyable.

There was a meeting of the speakers committee at the Chamber of Commerce room following the forum luncheon Tuesday. Five men were appointed to make plans for the agricultural-economic conference which will be held in Medford for three days, beginning with February 13. These men were B. E. Harder, H. L. Walther, C. C. Cate, A. C. Joy and J. J. Fuller. Arrangements have been made for ten or twelve different group meetings. Business men of Ashland are requested to see that all of the nearby farmers are able to attend the conference, together with the Ashland business men.

A. C. Joy, president of the Jackson county farm bureau, will preside. L. H. Ditcher of Holman street recently bought a new Ford runabout from the Harrison Bros. agency. The T. H. Simpson Hardware company are busy painting their store with a beautiful Winchester gray, which adds greatly to the place. All the wood work on the building has been painted, and there will probably be some more renovating in a short time. Quite extensive remodeling is being planned later in the year.

The postoffice receipts in Ashland for January show about a ten per cent increase over the receipts a year ago. This shows that the population and business in Ashland is steadily growing larger. The receipts have been growing larger each year, as shown in the Christmas trade during last December.

The average rainfall of Ashland, beginning September first and ending today, is 1.64 inches short of the usual rainfall during that time, according to weather observer, Louis Dodge. No rainfall was recorded here from the first of the year to the 29th of January, which is quite unusual.

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DECLARE BIG SUM TO BE EXPENDED ON GOLD H. SMELTER

A large custom smelter, mill and refining plant is to be erected at Gold Hill at an early date according to the announcement of officials of the Pittsburgh-Oregon Mining company of Pittsburgh, and the West Coast Finance company of Portland. Percy M. Johnson, president of the West Coast Finance company, has been gathering data and statistics during the past year in connection with the ore supplies of Southern Oregon. Gold Hill was finally selected as the most convenient and practical location for a custom smelter site and arrangements were being made to organize an independent smelting company with local capital when a consolidation of the smelter project was made with the Pittsburgh-Oregon Mining company, owners of the Sylvanite mine at Gold Hill. It is understood that in excess of \$250,000 will be expended upon the erection of a complete smelting and refining plant and for mine development.

The town of Gold Hill has made a tentative offer of an excellent smelter site conveniently located on the banks of the Rogue river and easily accessible to both railroad and highway.

A roughing mass meeting of mining and business men was held Tuesday evening at the chamber of commerce of Gold Hill at which time V. W. Brown, of Pittsburgh, representing the Pittsburgh-Oregon Mining company and Mr. Johnson outlined the plans for immediate action, which was greeted with enthusiasm. A substantial sum of over \$2000, to apply against the capital required, was pledged at the meeting and more is expected.

That Southern Oregon is due for the greatest boom in recent years is the opinion of Mr. Johnson who has been most active in bringing a custom smelter to Southern Oregon. "Southern Oregon is generally credited by the best authorities with having the greatest potential mineral wealth of any section in the United States—yet it stands today the least developed of any great mining district," said Mr. Johnson in an interview today.

"I have been reliably informed that no other mineral district in the world has such a great assortment of minerals as are found here. Two things have retarded the development due to this section—the lack of local facilities for treating base ore and the lack of appreciation of the enormous mineral wealth of Southern Oregon by the state in general, and, sad to say, by many business men and others right here in its midst."

"A custom smelter, mill and refinery to treat the ore will bring more great dollars to Southern Oregon than all your fruit, timber, livestock and farming combined—and that's an enormous sum. I have seen literally millions of dollars of ore in the stopes and ore dumps of mines in this district. Many people will ask why the mine owners have not shipped their ore to other smelters. The answer lies with the railroad companies in their high freight rates. No mine operator can pay from \$6 to as high as \$55 per ton to ship ore to either Tacoma or Selby smelter—when the values of his ore will probably not average over \$20 per ton.

"Therefore it has been unprofitable for most miners to mine ore having a value of less than \$50 per ton. With a local smelter, they can make a fair profit from \$8."

Mr. Johnson further stated that a complete and efficient corps of engineers will be maintained by the smelter interests to assist local miners to mine and handle their ores. A fleet of large trucks will also be used in hauling ore and concentrates. It is claimed, while several miles of aerial tramways will be used to connect such mines as the Sylvanite, Millionaire, Gold Ridge, Braden and others situated within two or three miles of the smelter.

Many mining claims have been filed in the vicinity of Gold Hill during the past week since the first news of the proposed smelter, and it is rumored that several large mining deals are under way as a further result. Old timers are sharpening their picks and drills preparatory to an early rush to the hills in search of the precious metals.

It is believed that the Blue Ledge and St. Albans mine interests will contribute ore in large quantities to help along the cause.

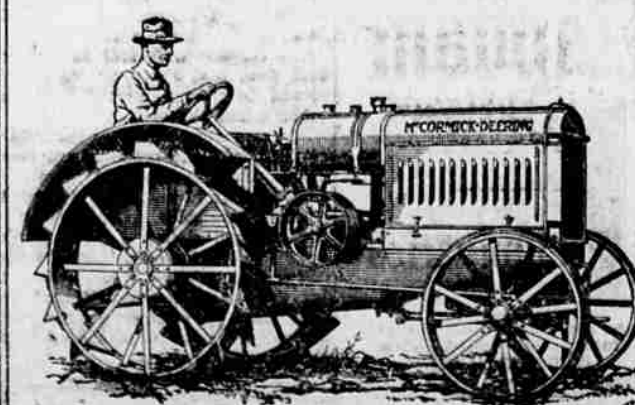
