CHICAGO EXPERT TO STUDY ALBANY BOTULINUS CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—Dr. J. C. Geiger of Chicago university, an expert on botulinus poisoning, is expected to arrive in Portland Monday or Tuesday to conduct an investigation for the United States public health service on the case at Albany where eleven persons succumbed to the dread disease.

Word of his coming was received here today by Dr. Frederick Strickler, secretary of the Oregon state board of health, who has collected a large number of samples of the toxin on the Albany case and has been conducting tests with it here.

Dr. Geiger will pay particular attention to investigation of the soil on which the beans were grown that produced the poison, according to Dr. Strickler.

The bacteria do not live in the beans themselves but in small particles of soil that may be left clinging to a vegetable, according to Dr. Strickler.

Portland Pastor On Trial for Faking a Ghost at Seance

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—The Rev. W. W. Aber, pastor of the Mystic Church of Bethesda, a spiritualist congregation, faced a court hearing this afternoon on a charge of "practicing fraud," preferred by J. H. Ashton, who has been a member of the Rev. Aber's congregation.

According to Ashton's charges made to Deputy City Attorney Stadter, Ashton and two friends visited a seance at the pastor's home January 31, and when the spirit of Ashton's grandfather was supposed to appear they seized the apparition and found it to be the pastor. The Rev. Mr. Aber denied the charges, declaring that Ashton's friends had seized a woman who was present at the seance.

Daily Report on the Crime Wave

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Miss Louise Lawson, a motion picture actress, formerly of Walnut Springs, Texas, was strangled to death today after a desperate battle with thieves in her fashionable apartment house in West 77th street. Gems valued at several thousand dollars are missing.

Miss Lawson, who was described as unusually attractive, had been taking minor parts in local film companies.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 8.—Five hundred pennies and an empty United States mail sack comprised the loot of burglars who last night entered the C. J. Krebber store at Pratum, according to Sheriff Oscar D. Bower.

A school house nearby also was robbed of three pictures and an American flag.

TACOMA, Feb. 8.—Angelo Pierucioni, 36, mill worker, was killed following an altercation on the streets of Raymond, Wash., this morning and Giovanni Orsucci, 36, employee of the Willapa Lumber company, is held in the county jail at South Bend as his slayer as the result of a feud between the two men, it is believed.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Directors of the Pan American Petroleum and Transport company voted today to withdraw the recent offer to stockholders to subscribe to the capital stock of the Pan American Western Petroleum company, which was recently organized to develop California naval oil leases.

LODI, Cal., Feb. 8.—Waldemar Putnam, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Putnam, died today from the effects of a beating said to have been administered to him by two older boys three weeks ago. It is expected the child's assailants will be in custody before night.

How Medford Cannery Kills The Deadly Botulinus Germ

The experiments from botulinus which have been conducted in several universities at the expense of the National Cannery association have shown that in ordinary vegetables a cook of at least 6 hours at a temperature of 212 degrees in boiling water, is necessary to destroy the most resistant spores of B. botulinus. At higher altitudes where water boils at a much lower temperature, an open bath cook must be much longer than this to accomplish the same results.

These results are confirmed by the experiences of home canning. During the last few years there have been a number of outbreaks of botulinus from home canned string beans. In the home the open bath process is usually employed and it is obvious that the same process is just as dangerous in the canning plant as in the home. Nearly all commercial canners process string beans under pressure. Obviously processing the string beans in the open bath would be as dangerous in commercial canning as in home canning.

It has also been shown that B. botulinus grows readily in beans and that the open bath process is therefore not

safe with that product. One outbreak of botulinus is ascribed to beans canned commercially by that process. In canning beans it is important to conserve the coloring-matter as far as possible, but it is far more important to make the process safe. A cook of 6 hours at 212 degrees which would be necessary to destroy B. botulinus has less sterilizing efficiency than a process of 20 minutes at 240 degrees in No. 2 cans. The color is destroyed far less in processing at the higher temperatures because of the shorter period of the cook. This process is used at the Medford cannery.

Officials of the club declared that the liquor was legally on the premises and that they had official permits for its possession. Investigation of this has been turned over to the federal prohibition officers.
