

BIG CROWD SURE AT SATURDAY'S GAME

At noon today a majority of tickets for the first of the Medford-Roseburg basketball games had been sold, showing a lively interest in the outcome on the part of the people in Medford. The game will begin at nine o'clock at the Medford Armory. The lineup will be as follows: Jimmie Allen, center; Merwin Chastain, Gilbert Knipe and Leo Glascock, forwards; Clarence Williams, Harold Reighelstein, Glen Fabrick and Earnest Hurt, guards.

The preliminary game which begins at 8:30 will be between the girls' teams of Medford and Grants Pass.

Roseburg has been defeated, but once this season, by the Eugene High and then only after three five minute periods overtime, playing off the tie three times and they are confident of victory. However, the Medford team is in splendid form and ready to make the fight of their young lives.

LETHAL GAS KILLS CHINESE

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The execution of Gee Jon was set for ten o'clock. The death chamber was a little stone building in the prison yard in which cells had been fitted for the condemned men. It was arranged for the Chinese to be strapped in a chair in the cell. The death gas to be vaporized from a liquid solution of hydrocyanic acid was in another airtight stone compartment. Warden Denver S. Dickerson had arranged for the witnesses to view the execution through two windows.

Cats Are Killed

A rehearsal of the execution yesterday afternoon snuffed out the lives of two cats in a time estimated at fifteen seconds. A portion of the hydrocyanic acid was pumped in through the floor in the form of a fine spray. The cats died, apparently instantly and without pain.

It was charged that Gee Jon and another Chinese, now serving a life term, were sent from San Francisco by a tong to "execute" Tom Quinn Koe, member of a rival tong. Quinn Koe, an aged laundryman, was shot down in his shop at Main, Nev., August 21, 1917. Gee's accomplice, whose sentence was changed to life imprisonment, made a confession implicating Gee Jon, but the latter denied he fired the shot.

In the long legal fight to stave off the execution two appeals were made to the supreme court of the United States on the ground that lethal was an "unusual and inhuman" form of execution. The supreme court refused to hear the petitions.

thoughtfully provided a "solid bronze" casket for \$2,600 or \$2,700, with a \$75 silk flag worth not more than \$25, to float over the grave.

"That when all is 'struck' on an Indian's property it is usually considered prima facie evidence that he is incompetent, and in the appointment of a guardian for him his wishes in the matter are rarely considered."
