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DEPUTY SHERIFF AND POLICE RAID LOCAL HOTEL ROOM

In a raid on a local hotel early last evening, under authority of a search warrant, issued through the district attorney's office, the sheriff and police, acting together, arrested Mr. and Mrs. Charles Depew of Weed, Calif., and a restaurant worker giving the name of "Smith," charged with alleged violation of the prohibition law. Mrs. Depew is held in the county jail, and the two men in the city jail.

The arresting officers were Chief of Police Adams, Deputy Sheriff Alden, and Policeman Cave.

Three gallons of moonshine, and one bottle of the same containing were seized. "Smith," according to Deputy Alden was so intoxicated he could not tell his name, and was slumbering in another room a short distance from the Depew's, when arrested.

A trunk belonging to the Depew's is held at the Southern Pacific, and a warrant for its searching will be sought today by the authorities.

According to the officers, Mrs. Depew arrived in this city by train, Wednesday evening, and Depew the following morning. The extent of their alleged activities is unknown, but the theory is advanced that they made regular trips in this city.

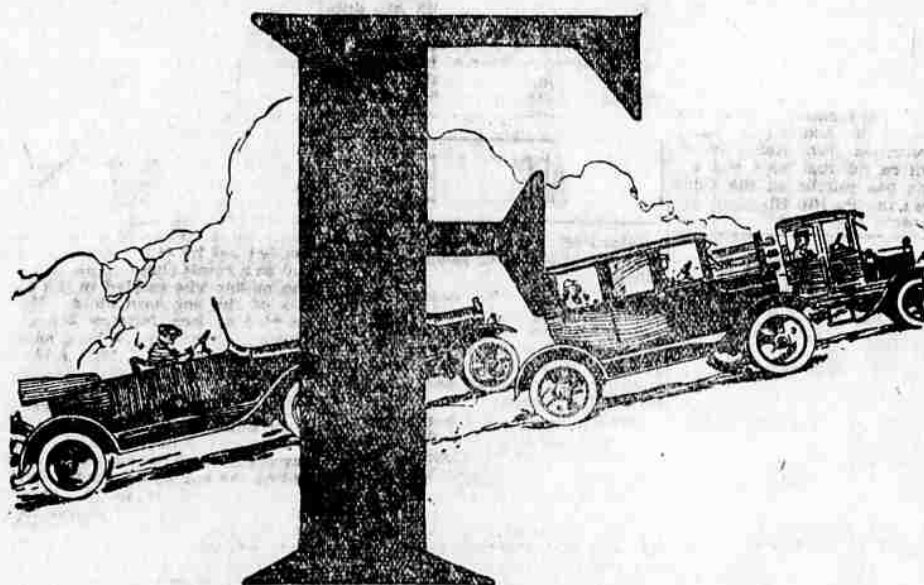
