The defense was represented by Attorney's Neff and Kelley, and the plaintiff by Attorneys Boggs and Pfeigal. The case lasted five days—one of the longest civil actions in the history of Jackson county.

ROSEBURG ROOTER FAINTED, THRILLS WERE TOO GREAT

Medford defeated Roseburg 23 to 22, in a basketball game at the Army Saturday night, before one of the largest crowds that ever witnessed an athletic event in Jackson county. Twenty-five hundred people from all over southern Oregon saw the thrilling battle. In the last quarter, when the excitement was at its height, a Roseburg rooter fainted on the floor. The victory is a step towards the championship of southern Oregon, and the right to play in the state tournament at Salem in March. A game will be played at Roseburg February 29. If Roseburg wins, the deciding game will be played at Ashland.

At one stage of the game Medford was six points ahead of their rivals and with two minutes to play, the locals adopted a safety first policy and started tossing the ball around in the enemy's territory, waiting for the closing pistol shot.

Into this formation tore Forward Singleton of Roseburg, desperate at the change of tactics. A foul by Chastain followed. One point was scored, and the second shot missed, but on the rebound, Roseburg slapped the ball into the basket, and brought the score up to 23 to 22. This was the thrilling situation when the game ended.
