

3 D'AUTREMONTS BELIEVED TO BE IN S. AMERICA

According to recent reports on the still unsolved Siskiyou train tragedy the railroad's losses in money, in the Siskiyou tunnel murders and attempted train robbery of October 11, last, will approximate \$6000. It is not known whether the money was stolen by the bandits, or burned in the mail car, but the tendency is to credit

the former theory. The D'Autremont brothers of Eugene, Oregon, were indicted in the Jackson county circuit court, and the federal court, as the bandits. It is also said that Paul D'Autremont, father of the three accused youths, after steadily maintaining their innocence for months, now "believes them guilty." Authorities now believe the D'Autremont boys are now in South America.

Investigations immediately following the robbery showed that they had written letters to steamship companies, seeking information relative to sailing dates of vessels to foreign lands.
