Walsh of Montana in the coming primary," in Georgia for the democratic presidential nomination.

WIFE MURDERER IS HUNTED BY POLICE

KELSO, Wash., Feb. 15.—The sheriff's force, believing that Eldon

Hutchinson is alive, is starting a campaign to locate him, on a charge of brutally murdering his wife. W. H. Rose, fire salesman, reported yesterday that he picked up a man answering Hutchinson's description at Vancouver on the afternoon of February 4 and carried him to Camas. When shown Hutchinson's picture by Portland police, he said it was Hutchinson that he carried.

JUDGE GILMORE OF ROGUE RIVER DEAD

The many friends of Judge O. H. Gilmore, who formerly lived at Rogue River, will regret to learn of his death this week at the home of his son in Chicago, where the judge went shortly after the death of his wife about two years ago.

The judge was a pioneer of Woodstock, Ill., and was very prominent in political judicial circles in that state, being one of the old school.

He lived on a ranch near Rogue River for several years and was an active member of the republican county central committee and was a member of the Presbyterian church.

SIMMONS KICKED OUT OF KAMELIA FOR HIGH TREASON

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 15.—Suspension of William Joseph Simmons from the Knights Kameia, an affiliated order of the Ku Klux Klan, was announced today by H. Tom Knight, secretary of the Knights Kameia, according to a story appearing in the Atlanta Journal.

Colonel Simmons also has been notified of the Kameia's intention to banish him on charges of high treason against the order, the article declared.

MARION, Ill., Feb. 15.—Withdrawal of troops from Williamson county where they were sent after a clash between Ku Klux Klan and anti-klan factions last Friday, leaves the neutral element of the citizenry to work out their plans for establishing an orderly control of affairs.

With the exception of one battalion of the 130th infantry, all military forces are scheduled to leave Herrin today and a number of units are expected to depart from Marion and other points where they have been stationed this week.

PORTLAND IS AFTER ELKS CONVENTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Exalted Ruler Barnett H. Goldstein of the local lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks today sent a telegraphic invitation to the grand lodge of the order at Chicago extending an invitation for the grand lodge to hold its 1925 convention in Portland. The invitation was based on a report of the special committee appointed by the exalted ruler to consider the advisability of inviting the Elks to come here. Local officials of the order said that the invitation is certain to receive favorable consideration by the grand lodge.

Seattle Receives a Shipment of Flies To Destroy Earwig

SEATTLE, Feb. 15.—A quantity of lachinid flies have been received by Professor Trevor Kincaid of the University of Washington from the United States governmental laboratories in France. They will be used to destroy the earwig.

The newly arrived lachinid flies are small parasites of grayish hue and about one-fourth as large as the average house fly, declared Professor Kincaid. The flies attack the earwig through its second generation, laying its eggs on the body of the earwig. When the eggs hatch the earwig host is destroyed by the young, being eaten as food.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Announcement of A. L. Jameson of McMinnville, president of the Oregon Hardware and Implement Dealers' association for the past five years that he will not be a candidate for reelection, has created additional interest in the closing day's session of the organization. W. H. Baldwin of Klamath Falls, vice-president, is mentioned as due to be advanced to the presidency. Among resolutions adopted by the convention was an endorsement of the McNary-Haugen wheat bill now pending before congress. The annual banquet tonight will follow the concluding session of the association.

WOMAN ATTACKED BY DENTIST GETS \$4000

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HIRAM JOHNSON SUPPORTS SENATOR M'NARY'S BILL

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Feb. 15.—The government is responsible for the plight of the farmer and must itself seek to remedy a part of its wrong, declared Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California, candidate for the republican presidential nomination today. Appeals to the farmer to plant more wheat met with a generous and patriotic response and now he is told he must help himself and return to diversified farming, Senator Johnson said. Low prices uniting with high cost of production are throttling agriculture, he said.

"The farmer has the right to ask his government for protection," he said. "He is entitled to the same generosity the government extends to manufacturers and railways. If governmental action can bring him relative prices between the commodities he produces and those he has to purchase, he should have it."

Senator Johnson said the McNary-Haugen bill now pending in congress, aims to restore a parity price on the principal staples, so a bushel of wheat a pound of beef, or a pound of pork, may have the same purchasing power as in the pre-war period. He contended the plan was not governmental price fixing, for it was intended to be self supporting without burden on the treasury, except for the initial revolving fund of the export corporation. "Of course the government alone cannot bring full prosperity to the farming regions," he said, "but it can give the farmer a fair chance to win in his long struggle for equity. Diversification, where possible, higher tariff, lower freight rates, all may be of some service; but of all the plans presented, the most promising now seems the McNary bill."
