

FARM CONFERENCE OPENS WITH BIG CROWD ON HAND

The first Jackson County Agricultural Economic Conference opened this afternoon, under the auspices of the Oregon Agricultural College and farm, civic and commercial organizations of this county. It gives promise of being a highly successful meeting, with a large attendance. Farmers began to arrive this morning, for the three days' session.

This morning was devoted to committee meetings of the various groups, and the arranging of the preliminary details for the opening session, in the Masonic hall this afternoon, when there will be a general assembly, of all in attendance with A. C. Joy of Ashland, president of the Jackson County Farm Bureau presiding. This meeting was called at 1:15 o'clock.

Paul V. Maris, director of extension service at O. A. C. will deliver the first address of the meeting on "The Purpose of the Conference," followed by a series of three minute talks on the "Condition of Agriculture in Jackson County," by the chairman of the various groups.

Routine business scheduled to come before the assembly is the election of a permanent chairman, a secretary, and a resolution committee.

Commodity groups met as follows at 2:30 o'clock.

The Livestock group in the smoking room of the Masonic building, the Small Fruit and Berry group in the club room of the Masonic building, the poultry group in the dining room of the Masonic building, the Farm Crops group in the Public Library and the Poultry group in the same building. The Land Settlement group in the basement of the Hotel Medford, the Home Demonstration group in the Liberty building, fourth floor, and the Landscape group in the parlors of the Hotel Holland.

MORO FANATICS WIPED OUT, BUT VICTORY COSTLY

MANILA, Feb. 18.—(By the Associated Press)—Lieutenant Eugenio Mondes and eight constabulary soldiers under his command and 35 religious fanatics, including two of their leaders, were killed in a fight at Balete, Agusan province, according to a constabulary report here today. Several other fanatics were wounded.

The majority of the fanatics who took part in the fight, it is believed here, were refugees who escaped from Buana Island, Surigao province, off the island of Mindanao, which has been the scene of several recent clashes between the constabulary and the fanatics.

The latest fight is thought by the constabulary to have virtually annihilated the last remnants of the aggressive fanatics.

LEGION CONTINUES ATTACK ON MELLON PREDICTS VICTORY

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—American Legionnaires were pushing their campaign for an ex-servicemen's bonus with renewed vigor today after a sensational spurt last night in which the treasury department was accused of "juggling" its estimates against the project and Secretary Mellon was charged with "misleading" the late President Harding and President Coolidge.

The charge of "juggling" was made at a bonus meeting by Colonel Thomas W. Miller, allen property custodian. He said a "high treasury official" had admitted the alleged manipulation of the figures to him and had confessed the estimates were dishonestly increased each time congress requested a revision because it was felt necessary at the treasury department to use stronger and stronger arguments against the bonus each time it came up.

Representative Benjamin L. Fairchild, republican, New York, said Secretary Mellon "misled" Mr. Harding in anticipating a \$600,000,000 deficit, when events proved there was a \$300,000,000 surplus in the treasury. This \$900,000,000 difference, Mr. Fairchild asserted, "prevented President Harding, perhaps more than any other feature, from signing the bonus bill."

Alvin M. Owsley, former commander of the legion told his hearers the bonus would pass the house by a five to one vote and get a majority in the senate, "eventually passing over the veto of President Coolidge."

M'ADOO SURE TO BE ENDORSED BY HIS OWN MEETING

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—More than 300 advocates of the candidacy of William Gibbs McAdoo for the democratic nomination for president today saw Judge David Ladd Rockwell of Ohio open the conference that will decide whether the Teapot Dome disclosures have made Mr. McAdoo unfit to continue as a presidential candidate.

A scolding scattering of women was noted in the gathering that followed the keynote speech delivered by Homer Cummings of Connecticut, former chairman of the democratic national committee.

The conference was called, Mr. Cummings said, "not only to discuss the fortunes of an individual, but to consider the fate of the cause of 'republicanism'."

"Those who control the republican party," continued Mr. Cummings, "in a desperate attempt to divert attention from their own dereliction are striving to implicate democracy in the disgraceful disclosures in the Teapot Dome case."

"Not one democrat official and not one person mentioned in connection with the democratic presidential nomination has been touched by the revelations."

"A special attempt has been made to discredit Mr. McAdoo, but it is known and admitted everywhere that Mr. McAdoo had no connection, directly or indirectly, with these scandals."

"The more statement of the situation reveals the absurdity of the suggestion that there has been any impairment of his strength as a candidate."

"The forces of liberalism have gathered around Mr. McAdoo to continue the struggle which began in 1913 to free American institutions from the thrall of special privilege."

MAKE NO CHANGES IN U. S. ATTITUDE TOWARD WAR DEBT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The American government's war debt policy remained unchanged after a conference today of the debt commission. The commission failed to act on proposals that the debtor governments be reminded again that the United States is awaiting funding proposals.

Proposals for a change in the American government's policy of waiting for debtor nations to initiate refunding negotiations were before a session today of the American debt commission.

The meeting was called by Secretary Mellon, the chairman, late last week, but he declined to talk of questions to be taken up further than to say that strong pressure was being brought to bear in some quarters in the transmission of a reminder to the debtor governments that the commission awaited their suggestions looking towards a funding agreement.

The commission expires in about a year and most of the members feel the funding program should be completed without the necessity for extending its existence.
