MEDFORD'S AUTO CAMP IDEA IS GIVEN A BOOST

Medford is closing its municipally operated automobile camp and is arranging a concession for a camp under private operation.

A Portland resident who has just returned from a visit in that southern Oregon city says: "The tourists were demanding more and more as the years passed and in most cases were quite able to pay hotel prices for the accommodations they expected in an open-air camp with a nominal fee."

"Medford has started a movement in Oregon which I should like to see extend through the state, and for that matter throughout the country."

Medford will let the concession to a highly responsible management, and has the assurance of clean grounds, ample facilities for cooking, shower baths and other moderate priced conveniences, with a choice between tents and cottages.

This Portland citizen continues: "Private ownership of the automobile camp may set a check on the increasing number of irresponsible migratory families who run up and down the coast in cheap cars, working in the harvest in summer and settling down on the charitable organizations of the cities for the winter."

"Many of these people have no home or registered voting place and no settled school for their children. It is not unusual to find children who enroll and then make hasty exits from a half dozen school districts during the school year."

"Medford's action also points the way to a matter I should like to see brought before our 1925 legislature; that is, to require the registration of every individual who stays over night in an auto camp, and to enforce, in this type of public lodging, our present hotel code of morals. At present we have no means of tracing irregular proceedings." — Portland, Oregonian.

DEMPSEY-GIBBONS MATCH WILL BE CLOSED THIS WEEK

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Two of the big boxing shows of the summer may be definitely arranged this week.

The return bout proposed between Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, and Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul, who gained the distinction of being the only man to remain the entire distance with the champion by lasting fifteen rounds at Shelby, Mont., last summer, is on the program today for discussion between Tax Rickard and Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager. Through his manager Eddie Kane, who was here some time ago, said Gibbons already had agreed to terms for the bout. Kearns has given indications he was satisfied with Rickard's tenders. The bout would be held in a new arena in the metropolitan district probably in New York state, about June 1.

Notable has been served by Luis Angel Firpo, the South American heavyweight, that unless the syndicate which has proposed a match between him and Harry Wills, the negro contender, deposited \$50,000 in a Buenos Aires bank to his credit this week he will consider the negotiations ended.

Low Raymond, spokesman for the syndicate, said the \$50,000 would be posted and Firpo would be handed \$100,000 more within 48 hours after his arrival here.

Miss Hollins in Golf Finals.
DEL MONTE, Cal., Feb. 19.—East and west were matched today in the finals of the Pebble Beach women's golf tournament, with Miss Marion Hollins of New York pitted against Miss Mary K. Browne of Los Angeles.

Miss Hollins, former national champion, became a finalist yesterday through her victory, two up, over Mrs. H. G. Hutchinson of Winnipeg, former Pacific Northwest golf champion. Miss Browne's semi-final match was with Mrs. Brent Potter of San Francisco. Miss Browne won, two up.

Pitcher Holds Out for Cash.
WICHITA, Kas., Feb. 19.—Eddie Maun, leading pitcher of the Western league last year, is demanding a share of the \$20,000 paid for him by the New York Nationals and declares he will not report to the Giants' training camp unless he receives it. Frank Isbell, owner of the Wichita club, has refused to divide the money with Maun.

"Bullet Joe" Holds Out.
NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Officials of the New York Yankees were worried today over the non-receipt of signed contracts from Pitcher "Bullet Joe" Bush and Catcher Wally Schang, as they were reported from Philadelphia last Saturday to have accepted terms. The first New York Giant squad will leave for the spring training camp at Sarasota, Fla., tomorrow.

MILWAUKEE—Lew Tindler, Philadelphia, outpointed Pinkie Mitchell of Milwaukee, in ten rounds, according to sport writers.

ST. PAUL—Dave Shade of California outpointed Billy Wells, English welterweight, in ten rounds, newspapermen decided.

The Screen

"Anna Christie," Rialto
"Anna Christie" on the screen is the new attraction at the Rialto theater today, which plays till Thursday night. Blanche Sweet acts the title role in the picture version and George Marion appears as the old sea captain, a part which he has made famous on both stage and screen. William Russell is Mat Burke, the stoker.

"Anna Christie," a play by Eugene O'Neill, won the Pulitzer prize in 1922 as the best piece of drama produced in America that year. Subsequently the play was taken to Europe and, if anything, won even greater triumphs over there. It is a profound and moving story of human nature in the raw, lightened throughout by flashes of humor and glorified by the undoubted genius of its author.



No writer for the stage today has a keener sense of comedy values and brighter lines than Aaron Hoffman, author of "A Big Reward," the mirth-provoking comedy which will be at the Armory on Tuesday night, Feb. 20th.

This year Hoffman had his sense of humor stirred by the flood of mystery plays in which strange and mysterious presences reach out of a dark corner and drag people to their doom. He just couldn't let the opportunity slip by to poke a little good-natured fun at this craze. The scene of "A Big Reward" is laid in a big New York hotel, where Kolb appears as a guest, a gay "man about town," while his roly-poly partner, Dill, is cast as a smart waiter.

PANAMA, Feb. 19.—The daily average of tolls paid for use of the Panama canal from February 1 to 15 is announced as \$73,684, exceeding the average for any month with the exception of December, 1914.

LIQUOR EVIDENCE POURED IN SEWER AT JACKSONVILLE

Evidence in liquor cases tried before this term of federal court, was ordered destroyed by the court this morning, and in accordance therewith Sheriff Terrill dumped the same into the sewer. The brown colored liquid, which ranged in alcoholic strength, from the 40 rod hootch of fact and fiction, down to the mild tea like concoction of the hippocock bootlegger approximated 15 gallons. The lot included evidence in two or three cases, that in view of recent happenings, were not considered worth re-trial.

The next term of the circuit court will begin Monday, and the trying of new criminal cases will begin March 10th. No date has been set for convening of the grand jury, which will be subject to call.

The most important cases coming before the March 10th session is that of the Sam Valley still, wherein B. L. Hatfield, Henry S. Wilson and L. Congo, all residents of Klamath Falls, were arrested by federal prohibition forces, and the sheriff's office.

Wilson is a former chief of police of Klamath Falls, well known in Klamath Falls. Congo is a resident of Klamath Falls. They are now out on \$2000 bail. Hatfield is held in the county jail. He was arraigned yesterday and given further time to plead.
