

# CONFERENCE IN FAVOR PLANTING NO MORE APPLES

The Jackson County Agricultural conference will close its three days' session this afternoon, with an assembly meeting of all the groups, when a "policy program" will be discussed and adopted. The "policy program" is expected to outline a definite program for the future development of all phases of agriculture. Salient points of this program have been threshed out for two days by the various groups.

The horticulture groups by resolutions adopted at Tuesday's sessions oppose the planting of any more Bartlett pears in this valley, until larger markets are developed. It was also deemed advisable to plant no more commercial apple trees.

The resolutions were as follows: Resolved, that this conference go on record as favoring a thorough and complete campaign for the eradication of blight in the valley and that the chairman appoint a committee of three instructing them to use their best efforts to force regular collections of lens on properties so affected and cleaned up by fruit inspectors.

Committee appointed on "Blight": A. C. Allen, E. W. Carlton and Dave R. Wood.

According to street gossip, Sid L. Brown will make the race on the democratic ticket for sheriff.

# CHRISTIAN QUILTS BEFORE CALLED TO GIVE TESTIMONY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Senate opposition to appointment of George B. Christian, secretary to President Harding, as member of the federal trade commission, led to withdrawal by President Coolidge today of Mr. Christian's nomination at the request of the nominee.

Opposition to him was expressed by several labor leaders and recently the senate inter-state commerce committee was told by Huston Thompson, chairman of the trade commission, that Mr. Christian called him to the executive offices early in 1923 and inquired as to the reasons for proceedings by the commission against the Famous Players-Lasky Moving Picture corporation.

Mr. Thompson declared he regarded Mr. Christian's course in regard to the picture corporation as unusual and said it appeared that "someone" was using the office of the secretary to prevent action. The committee immediately invited Mr. Christian to appear before it today, but he requested a postponement and last night asked Mr. Coolidge to withdraw his name.

# JAIL CONDITIONS BAD, GRAND JURY REPORT DECLARES

Sanitary and precautionary conditions in the county jail are declared bad, and the public is informed of the liquor prosecution situation without recommendation or comment, in the report of the grand jury, filed with the circuit court Tuesday. Records and evidence in the hands of a former special liquor prosecutor were not obtainable, according to the report, which also says: "Repeated attempts to secure possession of these met with a refusal on the part of the former special prosecutor to co-operate in any way."

The appointment takes effect the first of March and is in accordance with the new ordinance, recently passed by the council providing for plumbing and lighting inspection on all new buildings to be erected and for which permits must be obtained. The master electricians and plumbers who favored this ordinance, deem Mr.

The report of the grand jury is as follows: It is the general opinion of the grand jury that the conditions in the county jail are very bad; the plumbing is in a deplorable condition. Some leaking, while some has been patched up by the prisoners, or the attendants, in a manner that does not promote sanitation.

On the upper balcony around the upper tier of cells there is an iron railing which lacks about six feet to reaching the back wall on either side. In case of a struggle with a prisoner, this would be extremely dangerous to an official, as it would be an easy matter to force an official off the balcony. The grand jury recommends that this rail be extended on either side.

The prisoners in the county jail have a cupboard in which food is stored. This cover is open; the food is uncovered and is within a very few feet of the toilet, which is not very clean. The beds are very dirty, perhaps unfit to be slept upon. The prisoners wash their clothes in a tub in the same room in which they eat and sleep. Added to this the jail was overheated and a bad odor was apparent when the grand jury made its inspection.

In the above mentioned cupboard is a tray of knives and forks. While they could not be used for sawing out of jail, they would be a mighty dangerous weapon in the hands of a prisoner who wished to attack an official.

Another recommendation pertaining to the jail is that the windows should be fenced that small boys cannot loiter around and visit with the prisoners. A further recommendation is that some method be employed whereby the interior of the jail is not visible from the petit jury room.

The grand jury visited the machine shop as an indirect complaint had been received that matters were not in good shape there. The visit disclosed nothing irregular; in fact everything appeared in good shape there. Some criticism has been made of this grand jury because of its lengthy deliberations. This, perhaps is true, but was unavoidable, owing to an apparent lack on the part of some in promoting law enforcement.

The prohibition officers testified that many records and some evidence was in the hands of the former special liquor prosecutor. Repeated attempts to secure possession of these met with a refusal on the part of the former special prosecutor to co-operate in any way. This naturally put an extra burden on the district attorney, who after much time and labor was able to get some of the cases in shape to present to the grand jury.

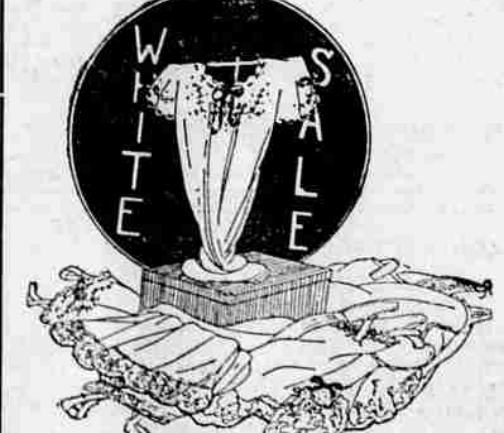
