

JACKSON COUNTY CONFERENCE BEST HELD IN STATE

A number of Oregon Agricultural College experts, in Medford for the Economic Agricultural Conference, were the guests at the luncheon of the Medford Chamber of Commerce at noon at the Hotel Medford yesterday. There was no designated speaker for the hour, but a number of these guests said a few words regarding the conference and their impression of the people and conditions in the valley.

C. J. Hurd, Paul V. Maris, Arthur Foster, O. M. Plumber and N. C. Maris were those who talked and they united in praise of the response shown by the people in coming to the conference and declared that it was the best attended county conference that any of them had ever seen and that the way the different groups grasped and analyzed the farm and marketing problems was marvelous.

"Farmer" Smith, 72 year old, land agent of the Union Pacific Railroad company, spoke for a few minutes on the marvels of the Oregon valleys and declared that as a place, for a man of limited means to make a home, by tilling the land, with the least outlay of manual labor, that the Rogue River valley was the most wonderful in the world.

Harry L. Walther presided at the luncheon, which was very well attended. He announced that to date 325 people had attended and taken part in the Agricultural Economic conference and in a few words thanked the O. A. C. men for their presence and their praise of the valley.

SURVEY OF GOLD HILL SMELTER TO START THIS WEEK

GOLD HILL, Feb. 21.—(Special.) The banquet given by the Gold Hill Commercial club Tuesday evening at their regular weekly meetings at the dining room of the Gold Hill hotel was a well attended social function and considerable business was transacted during the evening. Sixty plates were laid for the members and wives and invited guests. All the valley towns were represented at the meeting. Ex-Mayor M. S. Johnson, president of the club presided as chairman and toastmaster. The main topics discussed during the evening were the immediate construction of the smelter at Gold Hill and the further development of the Sylvanite mine three miles out from Gold Hill, which is owned and operated by the Pittsburgh-Oregon Mining company.

Percy N. Johnson, president of the West Coast Finance Co. who was instrumental in the development of the smelter project at Gold Hill was the principal speaker of the evening, opening and closing the discussion. He dealt quite extensively on the feasibility of the smelter project, the mineral wealth of Jackson, Josephine and adjoining counties in southwest Oregon, the favorable reports of the mining fraternity of the state on the project, and reported that the actual survey of the site and railroad siding to the site would commence this week. The city of Gold Hill is furnishing the site, consisting of three acres, in the new Water Park addition to the city and located on the river 1200 feet above the Pacific highway bridge across Rogue river on the west bank.

The Sylvanite mine is consolidated with the smelter project, and both are owned by the Pittsburgh-Oregon Mining company, of Pittsburgh.

"It is my opinion," said Mr. Lancaster, "that a 100 ton capacity smelter at Gold Hill will be kept going at full capacity, and undoubtedly the business will warrant a larger installation within a year. One of the most serious calamities to befall any community is to have a smelter shut down. I do not believe you folks need have the slightest worry on that score. A smelter here will be a big asset to all of southwestern Oregon and properly managed will prove a permanent and substantial business."

H. C. Diers, the chief engineer of the West Coast Finance Co. on construction was the next speaker. He will have immediate charge of the construction of the smelter at Gold Hill and some experience in this region before the war looking up the mineral wealth of southwest Oregon in view of the erection of a smelter in this district. In reporting the matter to his people at that time recommended that the smelter should be built at the city of Rogue River, nine miles below, but since coming back in the valley to further survey the region recommended the Gold Hill would be the most feasible site, due principally as a power site and its developed mines, which consist principally as large producers, the Sylvanite, Millonaire, Gold Ridge, Braden, and at least a dozen other smaller mines all within a radius of five miles from Gold Hill. Mr. Diers talked quite extensively on the ore of the district which fulfill all the requirements as smelting ores.

Among the other speakers who discussed the smelter and mining situation in southwest Oregon were J. E. Johnson, the civil engineer of the West Coast Finance company who is here to do the surveying and platting of the grounds and railway siding of the water site; Geo. W. Soramson, of Grants Pass, secretary of the southwestern Oregon Mining bureau; Henry M. Lancaster, mining engineer of Grants Pass, and S. E. Heberling, manager of the Millonaire mine.

Rev. W. Lee Gray and A. R. Braden, both made a splendid hit in discussing the church and community question which should be applied to the Gold Hill district, and they especially invited the Gold Hillites and the others present to visit one of their church and community nights and learn the Rogue River valley which has acquired an extensive reputation in the north end of the county.

V. H. Vawter of Medford, gave a brief talk on local pride and community feeling; and R. H. Bell, cashier of the Gold Hill bank and secretary of the club, who never tires of boasting local affairs, spoke for Victor W. Brown, general manager of the Sylvanite mine who due to illness was unable to be present. He reports that he is on the eve of a trip to the head office of the mine company at Pittsburgh, Pa., and his plans are all laid for final closing of the deal to finance the local smelter and Sylvanite mine.
