

ANOTHER FRAGAS IN ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE STARTED

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—Officials of the Anti-Saloon league of New York today were confronted with the assertion of Hollis O. Everhart, editor of the American Issue, that the election as state superintendent of Arthur J. Davis, former head of the Massachusetts league, was a triumph for the forces in sympathy with William H. Anderson whom Mr. Davis succeeded and who is under sentence for third degree forgery.

In submitting his resignation to the league board of directors yesterday Mr. Everhart said he could not "consistently with my conscience," certify that "all was now well with the league."

In nominating Mr. Davis, the resigning editor said, Dr. Purley A. Baker, head of the league's national organization, was not sufficiently acquainted with the facts of the New York situation to pass proper judgment.

Mr. Davis, he continued, was head of the committee which investigated the Anderson situation and personally fought in that committee for approval of Anderson's then unratified re-election as New York state superintendent expressing all confidence in him as late as February 1.

Breaking the silence he has maintained since his conviction Anderson characterized Mr. Everhart's charges as absurd.

U. S. GUNBOAT SENT TO PROTECT AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The gunboat Tulsa has been ordered from Galveston to Mexican waters and is to arrive at Tuxpam today.

Dispatch of the gunboat was ordered by the navy department at the suggestion of Secretary Hughes, after state department advice had reported that American citizens at Tuxpam desired increased protection. No actual injury to American nationals or interests have yet occurred.
