### NEW VERSION OF BOOTH'S DEATH IS TOLD HIGH SCHOOL

At what was probably one of the most interesting assemblies ever held at the Medford high school, the Rev. J. R. Sannett yesterday gave a forty minute talk on J. Wilkes Booth, the slayer of Lincoln, and his supposed suicide. Rev. Sannett told the lately developed theory that the man tracked to a barn where he killed himself and thought to be Booth was not the real assassin. Booth is said to have escaped, to have lived in South America and Mexico for a while until he finally came to Oklahoma where he committed suicide leaving behind him a complete confession, about five or six years ago.

This version is not the one generally accepted, but in later years it has been coming more and more into prominence. During all the years from Lincoln's death till now stories have persisted that Wilkes Booth was never captured.

When the talk was finished the teachers and pupils asked questions and discussed the story until the assembly which had begun at 10:30 had stretched to the noon dismissal.

"Such discussions are excellent training and an opportunity to develop historical judgment," said Aubrey G. Smith, when commenting on the assembly.

### CROWDED CONDITION IN HIGH SCHOOL IS WORRYING SUPT. SMITH

The news item about the opening of the second high school semester a week ago last Monday, published in the Medford Hi Times, the publication of the student body, as follows, has attracted much attention:

"The second semester of school opened last Monday. This is rather late in comparison with other years, but it is due to the fact that school opened two weeks late last semester. The semester will not close until June 13 this year.

"There were almost sixty new students enrolled at the beginning of this week. These were mostly mid-year freshmen that have graduated from the local grade schools. Among the upper grades of the incoming students there are two post-graduates from the senior class of last year. These are Rowan Gale and Dorothy Rogers. We are certainly glad to have them with us again this semester. With sixty new students enrolled in Medford high school, the total number is brought up to five hundred. This is at least fifty more than were ever before enrolled in the local high school.

"What to do with all these students is a problem which must be solved by Supt. A. G. Smith. Every year our enrollment is increasing and every year it is becoming more difficult to make room for the new students. Although there are a few vacant seats, Mr. Smith says that the school will have to order about 35 more desks. These desks will have to be crowded into the roll rooms and class rooms. If the enrollment increases next year, and no new high school is built, the school will be forced to rent some other building in order to make room for all the students. Let us hope that the voters of Medford will realize the crowded conditions before it comes to this."

Under-privileged children are: 1st. Those who have special abilities and through poverty or other causes are not able to train or develop those abilities. 2nd. Those of good general ability who might make capable citi-

zens or leaders but who are prevented from getting an education or who are likely to spend their lives on a low plane. 3rd. Those who are handicapped by physical disabilities which could be removed and would thereby release the proper energies. When the list of these children is complete, an effort will be made to aid those handicapped by poverty or physical ill health.

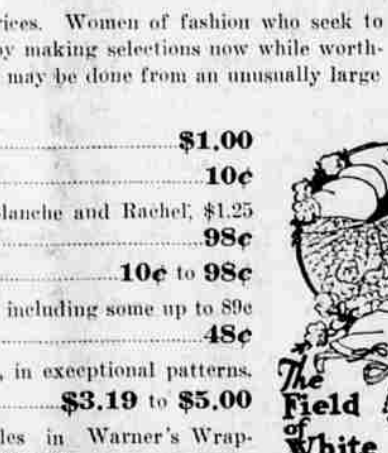
