## COUNTY COURT TO ASK BIDS, RUCH PAVING IN MARCH

Our county court has finally completed the plans and estimates for the paving of the road from Medford to Ruch, via Jacksonville, a distance of about 12 miles. Judge Gardner informs that the court will be ready to advertise for bids for this work about the middle of next month.

The road between Medford and Jacksonville, five miles, will be paved with asphalt, 15 feet wide and 3 1/2 inches thick. From Jacksonville to Ruch, seven miles, the paving will be concrete, nine feet wide and three and a half inches thick, and will be built on the south and east side or right hand side of the road coming this way from Ruch. This will give the heavy traffic coming this way the benefit of the paved road the entire distance. The other half of the road will be macadamized.—Jacksonville Post.
