CLAY PRODUCTS BRICK USED IN HOTEL MEDFORD

The Southern Oregon Clay Products company has elected new directors and officers for the coming year. The new board comprises Dr. Charles T. Sweeney, Medford, president; C. W. Loefer, Central Point, vice president; Albert E. Orr, Medford, secretary; treasurer; Elmer Hull, Table Rock, director; and A. R. McDonald, Eagle Point, director.

The stockholders voted to increase the capitalization to \$200,000 to take care of the expansion program contemplated for this year. The plans of the company include complete equipment for the manufacture of building and drainage tile and two big 24 foot burning kilns.

Over a quarter million brick have been sold by the company recently. The new addition to the Hotel Medford is being built with brick made at the Central Point plant, and several carloads have been shipped to Grants Pass and other Southern Oregon points.

The additional financing plans are in the hands of the West Coast Finance company of Portland, who are establishing offices in Medford.

'FARMER' LODGE IS KNOCKED OUT BY LUIS FIRPO

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 25.—(By the Associated Press)—Luis Angel Firpo still was the heavyweight champion of South America today having disposed of "Farmer" Lodge, American heavyweight, by a knockout in the fifth round of their bout at the River Plate football field.

Thirty thousand fans cheered their idol as his opponent was carried to his corner. The finishing blow was a terrific right to the body, preceded by a left to the jaw.

Lodge took the aggressive at the outset, forcing the Argentinian to the ropes, but after his initial onslaught Lodge never had a chance. Twice before the knockout he was sent to the floor by the flailing right, which is Firpo's favorite blow. Lodge's punches lacked power and he clinched repeatedly.

The referee was obliged to use force to pull him out of some of these embraces.

At the beginning of the fifth round with Lodge groggy, Firpo tried for a knockout. Driving rights and lefts to the ribs and over the heart, he forced the American about the ring. Once, missing a terrific swing, Firpo went to his knees himself, but was up in an instant. The knockout blow was a straight right which sank deeply into Lodge's body, doubling him up like a jackknife. The American crumpled to the floor and fell face downward, lying motionless as he was counted out.

Firpo weighed 218 pounds and Lodge 213.

Hugh Gartland, business representative of the South American heavyweight champion, declared Firpo under no circumstances would agree to place himself under the control of the Raymond syndicate as a condition to matching him with Harry Wills.

Gartland said Firpo had too many chances for profitable engagements to limit his activities in the United States before the time for the proposed Wills match.

Firpo Deal Probably Off.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Abandonment of the proposed bout between Luis Firpo and Harry Wills, negro contender for the heavyweight title next July under auspices of a syndicate headed by Lew Raymond, seemed probable today. The syndicate plans to deposit a \$50,000 forfeit this week in a New York bank and ask Firpo to agree to place himself under its control from the time he arrives in this country until the moment he enters the ring with Wills.

5 NEW WORLD'S RECORDS HUNG UP BY BOY WONDER

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 25.—With five world's records tied to his belt, \$9000 in prize money stowed away in his wallet and 500 points toward the 1924 American Automobile association championship written down to his credit, Harlan Fongler, the "boy wonder" of board and brick speedways today was grooming himself and lightning-bolt mount for new conquests to follow his spectacular victory in the 250 mile classic at Beverly Hills yesterday.

Fongler tore off the 250 miles without a single stop, leaping into the lead in the first lap and staying there until he had finished in two hours, nine minutes and 14 3/5 seconds. His average speed for the distance was 116 miles an hour, displacing the former record of 115.65 miles an hour established by Jimmy Murphy on the same track a year ago.

He broke records as he went along. For fifty miles he set a new one: 17.1 an hour. At the 100 mile post he set up another: 116.5 miles an hour. For 150 miles he established a new mark of 116.2, for the 200 mile distance, 116.2, and for the 250 miles, 116 miles an hour.
