HARRY ROSENBERG OFF FOR EASTERN TRIP

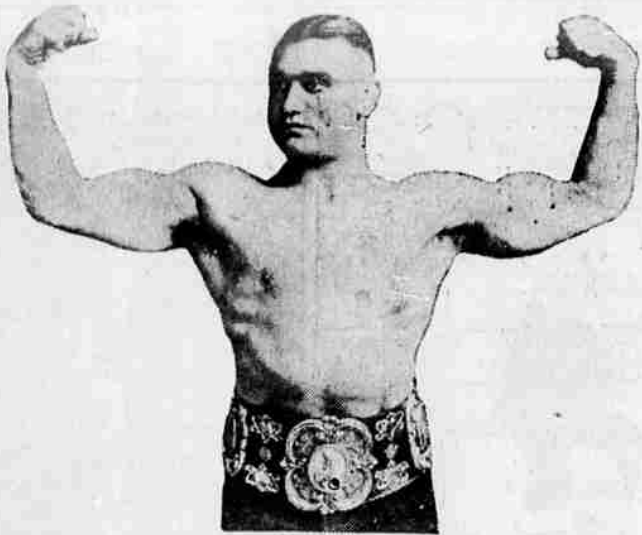

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Relief for the children of Germany "will not only save the starving youngsters," Major General Allen, who was commander in chief of the American army of occupation, declared in an appeal made public today by the Federal Council of Churches. "But it will help American farmers by taking surplus food supplies and is in the interest of peace."

"It will keep a nation of 62,000,000 persons from political and social chaos," he said.

Teaching Certificate of Local Teacher, Revoked

At the recommendation of the Medford school board and Superintendent of Schools Smith the state teaching certificate of Miss Kathleen Kenney, teacher at the Jackson school, has been revoked by State Superintendent of Schools J. C. Churchill. This was done because she violated her contract with the school board, as during the Christmas vacation period by accepting a teaching position in California, and did not return. The board's first intimation of this state of affairs came in her telegraphed resignation from California.

The state superintendent has not yet acted on the case of Miss Margaret Lea of Seattle who taught at the Lincoln school and later at the Washington school, and who two days before the Christmas vacation left without warning and did not return. Superintendent Churchill's decision in this case has been postponed until March 15. It is understood that the local school board and officials have recommended that her state teachers' certificate also be revoked.

didn't get a chance to talk to these gentlemen so much as you'd think."

"I do recall that after the testimony was given that Mr. McLean did not furnish Secretary Fall's \$100,000," Mr. Slomp went on, "I was at Mr. McLean's and Secretary Fall was there. He said his physicians advised him to go to Bermuda but that he was going to stay in spite of ill health, until the committee got the facts."

"Secretary Fall said there was a gentleman who had been associated with him for thirty years who knew the truth and that this man should tell the committee the facts. If the man didn't, Fall said he would himself and I advised him to do so."

Senator Walsh asked if the witness had "communicated to the White House as to these remarkable facts."

Mr. Slomp said all the facts had been given to the press by the committee in the fullest way but that he had sent messages to the White House. These, he said, might be considered confidential.

"I have the messages here," he said, "but as a matter of fact none of them relate to the oil matter. There is a question of precedent as to making them public."

Senator Walsh did not take the message copies. Mr. Slomp said he did not know Sinclair or Doheny.

FINANCE COMPANY TO LOCATE HERE SAYS PRESIDENT

Announcement was made today by Percy M. Johnson, president of the West Coast Finance company that his firm has taken a lease on a ground floor office in the Holland Hotel building and will take possession as soon as the carpenters complete the installation of counters and partitions.

Another branch is being installed at Gold Hill in order to facilitate the company's operations at that place. Although the principal headquarters of the West Coast Finance company are in Portland, it is stated that during this year the bulk of the business of the company will be in southern Oregon and will be handled from the Medford office.

"Our company is a personal service corporation," said Mr. Johnson, in announcing his plans. "Our business is that of financing industrial enterprises thru the sale of bonds or other securities. We are more interested in the development of natural resources than in any other line of endeavor and we see a busy period ahead of us in southern Oregon, with its abundant opportunities for the development of its irrigation, timber, mining and other vast resources. We feel confident of bringing considerable outside capital into southern Oregon this year for the simple reason that the natural facilities are here to attract investment. We are not anticipating a 'boom' here; just a sound, substantial growth and development. After a year's investigation, we are especially interested in the development of the mineral resources of southwestern Oregon, for we are confident this district will soon become one of the nation's biggest producers of gold, copper and other valuable minerals. All this country needs is the proper publicity. If outside capital once learns the development opportunities here nothing can stop the influx of substantial investors."

The West Coast Finance company is responsible for the new smelter project at Gold Hill and is also handling the financing of the Southern Oregon Clay Products company at Central Point. It is understood they have other projects in view for early development. Mr. Johnson also announced his company will add a real estate and insurance department.

Other members of the West Coast Finance company now in Medford are H. C. Diers, mining and smelter engineer, E. J. Kingsley, auditor, and Geo. F. Hayes, field superintendent. It is rumored that several well known Medford business men are to become identified with the West Coast Finance company in the near future.
