Harry Wills Out of It.
NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—Cable address from South America indicating that Quentin Romero-Rojas, the Cuban, has accepted Tex Rickard's offer of opportunity to follow the champion cut by Luis Firpo to a championship bout with Jack Dempsey. He added color and variety to the heavyweight program now being made for 1924.

Doc Kearns has assured Rickard that Dempsey will be ready to take Romero-Rojas if he comes up to expectations.

Firpo, it appears, following the apparent collapse of negotiations by a desire to match him with Harry Wills and a statement by Rickard that he will abandon efforts to match Wild Bull and Dempsey if Romero-Rojas comes through, will end the season on a tour through America, meeting favorite sons.

Harry Wills, who has been seeking Dempsey match for two years, is being considered prominently in new alignment.

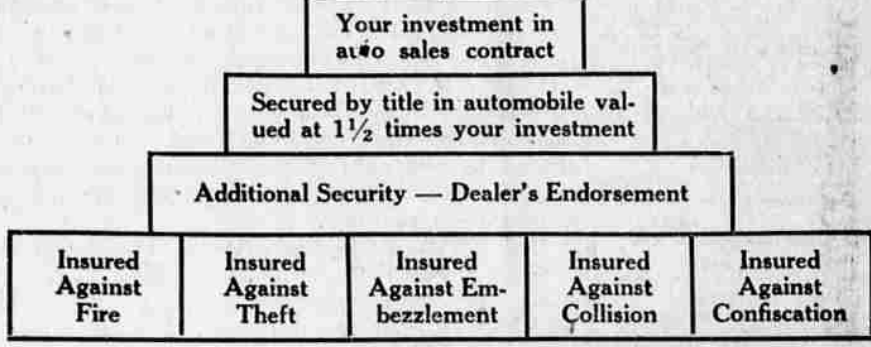
