Non-Fattening Foods.

With the steadily rising birth rate in America goes a constantly increasing demand for good nourishing satisfying foods which will not fatten.

Not to be humorous about it, perhaps the lemon and its savory juice holds the crowning place in list of non-fattening foods. Indeed, the lemon or its zestful juice will do more than any mere food can do.

according to some beauty experts, it will positively reduce the weight of the unsophisticated one.

The unromantic and therefore unwelcome truth, is that a lemon or two every morning or the juice thereof will probably increase the weight by precisely a fraction of the weight of the lemon or the juice.

Some very credulous fat folk seriously believe that by eating bread which bears a medicinal title or brand they can reduce, but the unpopular truth again is that any reduction of weight actually obtained while "dieting" on such bread is due solely to the general dietary restrictions, the general reduction in the intake of food and any exercise adhered to while the "treatment" is being used.

I do not mean to convey the idea that all foods have the same nutritive value or that one will grow fat or lean regardless of what foods one eats. A pound of cheese will fatten one as much as 14 pounds of cabbage will, and a nut fudge sundae will keep one's waistline up to par just as effectively as two quarts of buttermilk will.

The easiest thing in the world to grow fat on is good candy, and the hardest to achieve this disgrace with is iceberg lettuce but these are all good foods and have the proper place in a normal dietary.

I think I understand what the unhappy individual in quest of nourishing but non-fattening foods really needs. She—only an occasional man wakes up to the disgrace of obesity before he is utterly overtaken by the insidious disease—she needs a warning against her present overindulgence in carbohydrates. The carbohydrates are so very good to eat—

are, nearly everything good to eat is more or less carbohydrate, that's just the trouble. Carbohydrates are about as easy to eat as some creatures are to look at, and either pastime is likely to prove ruinous if not kept within reasonable bounds.

With no desire to whet pathological appetites, I shall now mention the delectable carbohydrates which are mainly responsible for our rising national girth rate:

Sugar, glucose (in ice cream and candy), honey, the syrups, crackers, breakfast cereals, white bread, put-in-fat, potatoes, most proprietary infant foods, condensed milk, cookies, toast, biscuit, cornstarch, pie, pudding, cake.

In fact, about everything nice to eat, except tobacco.

Sugar, potatoes and breakfast cereals are not fattening if one eats only reasonable quantities of them.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

Away to Florida.

My husband and I had planned to spend a few months in Florida, but after reading your talk on hookworm disease, we have hesitated about going there. Just what danger would we run in visiting Miami and stopping at good hotels in that part of Florida?—Mrs. M. E. G.

Answer—The real estate agents would bother you more than the hookworms. If I were your husband's wife I wouldn't let any pesky little hookworms spoil my fun. Keep your shoes on when you go for a walk and you'll run no risk at all. Such hookworm pollution of the soil as there is in Florida is in the backwoods sections where the people are primitive about the disposal of human excrement. No danger of getting hookworm disease in or about Miami.

Calcium of Lime.

What quantity of calcium or lime salt do you advise for use with table salt to supply a lime deficiency in ultrafined diets?—Mrs. H. K. C.

Answer—Mix the salt for use in the salt cellars with calcium carbonate, half and half, and use this mixture on the table in place of straight salt. A simplified, perhaps better way to get more lime (calcium) would be by eating more cheese of any and all varieties, more peanuts as a substantial food rather than a mere relish, and more cabbage.

Co-operative Poultry Marketing.

To the Editor:

Eggs and Poultry of high quality can be produced in southern Oregon as cheaply if not more so than in any other section of the United States. Our climate, our soils and the moderate cost of land is mainly responsible for this.

Local poultry products have been increasing phenomenally during the last few years. In 1922 the output was twice that of 1921 and the 1922 output nearly doubled that of 1921. At present our production is greater than the local demand to the extent of approximately 400 cases weekly. Unless we ship these eggs out in car lots we are at the mercy of a high (nearly prohibitive) express rate. Carload shipments in a locality where the total head of stock does not exceed 50,000, is possible only when the total product is marketed through one agency.

A drive for membership has been launched by the Poultry Producers Co-operative association of Southern Oregon and within a few days all non-members will have the opportunity to align themselves with that body. Copies of the marketing agreement and by-laws of the association will be mailed to you. If you fail to get your copy, notify the office. Your prompt action in signing up will greatly facilitate the work of and be greatly appreciated by the membership committee.
