TIME TO TAKE OIL BEARINGS.

ONCE MORE a refinery is needed in this oil deluge, to separate the high grade from the crude. To quote Charley Murphy at his first football game: "What is this noise all about?" To answer this question one must go back to first principles for a moment. The noise, of course, is about oil. Uncle Sam had a large acreage of oil land, in his naval reserve. There were three things to do with it. First, keep it idle in the reserve. Second, go into the oil business and get out the oil. Third, lease the oil land to some private oil company, on a royalty basis. But, according to geologists,—at least some of them,—to keep the oil reserve inactive meant to lose the oil by drainage to the private interests on the border of the naval reserve. For the navy department to enter the oil business, meant the expenditure of millions of dollars, and radical departure in the uncertain realm of government ownership and operation. So the third method was adopted on the ground that the big oil operators would furnish the capital for development, assume the risks,—and the oil business is full of risks under the best circumstances,—and Uncle Sam would be assured of getting a portion of his oil, as clear profit.

In all this oil hubaloo, we have yet to learn, just what the cheer leaders of the oil corruption chorus would have had Uncle Sam do. Nor has there been any convincing evidence presented, that what was done, was not the best thing that, under the circumstances, could be done. If the oil was being drained off by private operators, and if government ownership and operation of oil wells is not desirable, then the program of oil leases on a royalty basis, was, as far as we can see, the only alternative. If this is true, then the main question comes down to whether or not this program was put through honestly or dishonestly; whether Secretary Fall, for example, was bribed or not bribed, whether the government was properly recompensed for what it gave or was swindled, and these matters, as President Coolidge has said, are not a matter for the politicians, but for the courts to decide. It must be admitted that all the circumstantial evidence points to guilt on the part of Mr. Fall. As far as public opinion is concerned he must prove his innocence to clear his name. But guilty or innocent, it is desirable at the present time for the people to avoid confusion on the main principles involved, and try to separate once more, the high grade from the crude, political bunk and popular hysteria, from the salient and vital elements in the case.

Personal Health Service

Take a quick run up two flights of household size stairs and focus your attention on your heart action and you'll find the heart going thump, thump as the hand bumping the ribs hard, for a little while, if you are sound and well. Jump and deny out of bed in the morning and notice that you get just a wee bit dizzy, if you are a healthy customer. In a gloomy, introspective moment search your field of vision carefully and you'll find divers and sundry spots before the eyes, if there is nothing ailing you. I am confident, in fact I could get up a symptom blank after the fashion of the mail order quack which would work havoc among well folk who might get hold of it. "Have you spots before the eyes?" "Do you feel dizzy at times?" "Does your food disagree?" "Oh, sure, everybody's food disagrees more or less when he gets thinking about it seriously. Take the rumblings and grumbles that harass some of us from within. These grumbling noises are produced by the peristaltic or wave movements of the intestine acting upon the fluids and gases which are normally present. They're present all the time, nearly, and the noises are nearly always audible with the stethoscope. They don't mean anything. So we doctors call the noises borborogym. When a meal has been taken after a brief period of fasting, the passage of the fluids and gases of the residue of that meal thru the valve from the small into the large intestine may be heard about six hours later, if the individual is a healthy specimen. As a rule these borborogym are no more audible or noticeable to the individual himself or another than are the spots before our eyes noticeable, unless we form the habit of giving them attention. Sometimes the borborogym become obtrusive when a person is beginning to get very hungry. The obvious remedy in such a case would be a snack between meals, when it is a long time between meals and the weight is not already excessive. This snack should be something which requires chewing, not a gulp of fluid or candy. I'd suggest some peanuts, an orange or an apple. In some instances, annoying borborogym prove to be due to the habit of air swallowing, a habit unconsciously indulged in by persons fond of having "nervous spells." I say persons fond of having spells—that isn't sarcastic, but psychologic. Nervous spells are a kind of funk hole to hide in until the thing you wish to evade or escape is out of your way. An old favorite theoretical explanation for these rumblings from within, especially when the noises are associated with flatulence (presence of an excessive amount of gas in the intestines is fermentation. Of course only
