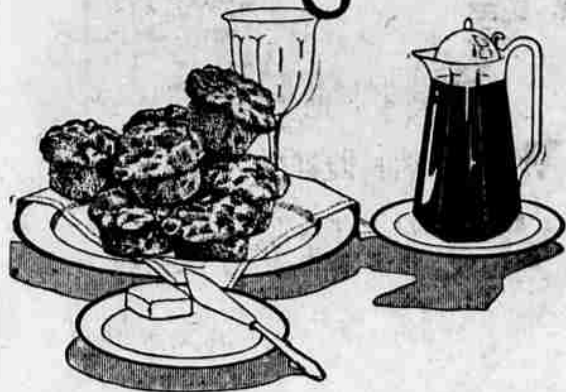

MOVIES FAIL AS TEACHING MEDIUM EDUCATORS CLAIM

CHICAGO, Feb. 29.—The movie has yet to prove its effectiveness as a teacher of youth, judging by opinions expressed today by speakers before the department of superintendence of the National Education association. The American boy and girl misleads many educators by showing an intense interest in entertaining motion pictures. Let the object of the movie be education and the youngster is likely to doze, Frank N. Freeman, professor of psychology of the University of Chicago, advised the meeting.

"The value of motion pictures," Professor Freeman said, "lies more in the peculiar content of the experiments which they make possible than in their stimulating effect upon the child's interest."

A. W. Abrams, director of visual education in New York, expressed much the same view. Public schools have the job of making good citizens out of 25,000,000 American youths and 13,000,000 aliens, Superintendent Fred M. Hunter of Oakland, Cal., told the convention. An army of 750,000 teachers is at work on the task, he said.

"Money for schools is money invested; money for roads and public buildings is money expended," declared E. W. Butterfield, state commissioner of education for New Hampshire.

"Schools," he said, "are maintained by public taxation, as are highways, public buildings, police and fire protection. From all the rest, schools are by nature separate. They never should be supported from the same budget, administered by the same officers or joined in the public mind when support is sought."

"The tax for education is of immediate value but it is a purchase which increases in worth each year until the pupils in full measure can enrich the state by their industry and civic virtues. The money for schools has been invested, not expended."

DISCOVER MAN IN PARIS WITH GENUINE HALO

PARIS, Feb. 29.—Interesting tests of a medium claimed to possess a mysterious luminosity—the emission of blue light rays with radiographic properties—are announced by Dr. Gustave Geley of the Metaphysical Institute here. The medium is an Italian named Erto, or Castellammare di Stabia, brought to Paris recently for a more searching examination after experiments in Italy had failed to solve the question of whether the subject's peculiar properties were natural or procured by some artificial means.

Dr. Geley claims that he subjected Erto to the most rigorous tests. The examiners declared that Erto, when placed in a darkened room, appears to be surrounded by a kind of halo, while every now and then a clearly defined fan-shaped ray of light is projected from the left side. Occasionally also, a cone of light appears above the head.

ANOTHER PORTLAND ROAD HOUSE OWNER IS FOUND GUILTY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—A verdict of guilty on all three counts of the indictment, charging possession and sale of liquor and the maintenance of a nuisance, was returned by the jury here today in the trial of Anthony Tully, owner of the Old Homestead Inn near here, before Federal Judge Wolverton. Tully was granted twenty days in which to appeal his case.

Tully's conviction follows closely the conviction and jail sentence of Fred Merrill, owner of the Plantation Inn on a similar charge.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 29.—The Temple of the Golden Calf, mentioned in the Old Testament, has been found by the joint expedition of the University of Pennsylvania museum and the British museum near Ur of the Chaldees, Dr. George B. Gordon, director of the university museum believes. He expressed the belief today that Nebuchadnezzar's temple, which the expedition has uncovered, is identical with the golden calf temple.

Parachute Record Broken SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Feb. 29.—Sergeant C. E. Conrad, Kelly field, broke the world's record altitude parachute jump here recently. He leaped from 21,500 feet.

BRITISH AIRMAN FOR RACE WITH U. S. AIR FLEET

SEATTLE, Feb. 29.—American and British around-the-world flights will start simultaneously and the winner of the race should be the one who returns first to his starting point after circling the globe. Lieutenant Colonel L. E. Broome, advance pilot of the British flight, today declared here on his arrival from British Columbia.

"The race will not be decided on actual flying time," said Colonel Broome. "Forced landings and other trouble are all part of the game and the race should go to the crew that overcomes all obstacles and returns first."

Colonel Broome will sail Thursday from Vancouver, B. C., on the steamship Thierval with petrol and oil for the British airplane. Sealed cases of rations sufficient for four men for ten days, will be placed along the Alaskan coast and the Aleutian islands, the Siberian coast line and the Jurien islands. The exact locations will be established at the following points: Vancouver, Bella Bella, B. C.; Fort Wrangell, Yakutat, Cordova, Alaska; Port Chatham, Chignik, Dutch Harbor, Nazan bay, Chapel cove, on Adak island, Kiska harbor, Chigagoff harbor, on Attu Isle, Preobrazheniya anchorage, coast Kamchatka, Petropavlovsk, Cod bay on Shumshir island, Blakiston bay on Oneketau island, Brough-ton bay and Hitokapu bay on Yeterup Isle.

AVIATOR DOESN'T LOSE SENSES IN 1000 FT. FALL

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Feb. 29.—Popular belief that a man falling 1000 feet will lose consciousness in the terrific speed attained seemed disproved today by Corporal C. Eugene Conrad of Kelly Field, who now holds the southern record for parachute jumping as a result of successfully descending from an airplane at an altitude of 21,500 feet here yesterday.

Conrad retained consciousness in a drop of 1100 feet from the plane before his parachute opened and counted the seconds and when eight had elapsed pulled the cord which opened the parachute. Less than 25 minutes later he landed safely.

It was not equipped with a super-charger and thus established a record in altitude for a regulation army plane.

61,770 Miles of Hogs Butchered in United States, 1923

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—A double file of hogs around the world at the equator and a single unbroken line from the north pole to the southern end of South America, is the graphic picture presented by the department of agriculture of America's slaughter of pork last year. The department's statisticians calculate the 81,539,600 hogs killed for consumption would reach 61,770 miles if placed end on end, allowing four feet for each hog. The same number, they add, if placed 21 abreast would form a bristling lane from New York to San Francisco.

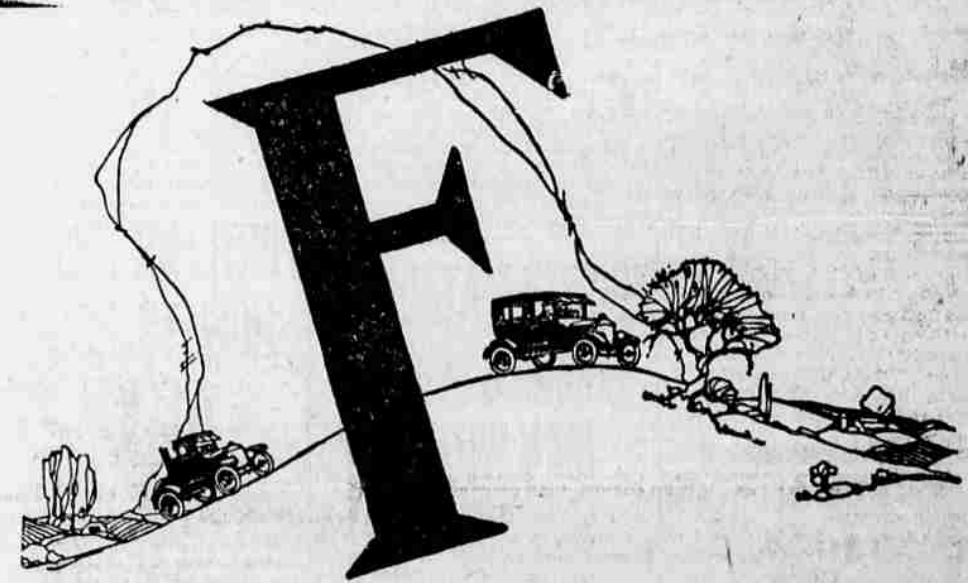
S. P. Reduces Freight Rate.
